1a) Describe the most important results of the research performed at the Centre

In the following, we will present our replies and views on the issues brought up in the evaluation form. An important starting point is that SoRAD since the first evaluation has considered the Centre of Excellence (CoE) grant as part of the long-term basic funding of SoRAD. The Centre grant is therefore inseparable from SoRAD, and vice versa. The main focus in this evaluation is on the impact of Centre of Excellence grants, and we would argue that it has been of vital importance for SoRAD's continued existence, but also instrumental for the institutionalisation of addiction and substance use research, both at Stockholm University and nationally.

The research conducted under the FORTE Centre of Excellence grant has been focused on three themes within the fields of alcohol, drugs, tobacco and gambling: (1) consumption, problems and norms; (2) policies and their implications; and (3) societal reactions, treatment and recovery processes. Results of the research are discussed here in terms of those headings, though specific projects and publications have often reached across the themes. It should be noted that the publications discussed here are only a limited selection of SoRAD's peer reviewed publications during 2007-2017.

1. Consumption, problems and norms: This theme includes studies of Swedish levels and patterns of alcohol, drugs, tobacco and gambling use and behaviour, often in a comparative perspective, with attention to changes over time and to diverse consequences of use and misuse. A central goal has been to integrate epidemiological studies with research on norms and attitudes concerning use and the meanings of use in people's lives.

Reviewing trends in Swedish alcohol consumption and harm since 1990, Ramstedt (2010) noted that alcohol consumption in Sweden has grown by 20 per cent as a result of an increasing consumption of wine and strong beer. Alcohol had become much more affordable, and Swedish membership in the EU had greatly extended possibilities to bring back cheaper alcohol from other EU countries. But despite the increase in consumption, indicators of alcohol-related harms did not show consistently increasing trends.

More recently our understanding of population trends have been enhanced and nuanced by work, in which SoRAD played a leading role, bringing age-period-cohort (APC) analysis to bear in alcohol studies. The rise in consumption noted by Ramstedt had peaked about 2005, and then the trend had shifted to a decrease. Using Age Period Cohort (APC) analysis, Kraus et al. (2015a) showed that high-consuming birth cohorts of the 1940s-1950s were key in the rise in consumption, but that the recent slackening reflected not only less drinking by those cohorts in older age but also less drinking among younger cohorts. A collaborative APC analysis of alcohol-specific mortality involving six Nordic and central European countries

(Kraus et al., 2015b) found that Sweden diverged from other countries in showing a period effect of a slightly decreasing trend in mortality, while joining other countries in a decrease in such mortality in cohorts born after 1960. This work put Swedish research in the forefront of the introduction of APC analysis techniques to the field, and provided a strong background for SoRAD's studies of decreasing consumption in youth cohorts discussed in Theme 2 below.

Analyses by SoRAD staff also extended knowledge about temporal relationships in alcohol consumption in terms of the relationship between a father's drinking and a son's alcohol-related hospitalisation. Greater alcohol consumption by the father increased the risk of alcohol-related hospitalisation of the son after age 20, and particularly after age 40 (Hemmingsson et al., 2016). A longitudinal study of women's drinking between teen and middle age found substantial variation over time, with developmental patterns resembling those in male cohorts (Wennberg & Anderson, 2013).

SoRAD staff also made substantial contributions concerning illicit drug epidemiology. Ledberg and Wennberg (2014) developed a new method for estimating the size of hidden populations from register data. In another methodological innovation, Ledberg (2015) developed a novel measure to trace trends in the interest in web-based discussion groups concerning a particular substance, finding markedly less interest after a substance was scheduled and thus no longer legally available.

Ledberg (2017) investigated changes in mortality of those enrolled in methadone maintenance treatment (MMT) in Sweden following changes in the regulations controlling the programs in recent years, with criteria for admittance now much less strict. Death rates for periods in treatment and out of treatment were determined and compared to rates for the general population. While the death rate among those entering MMT in Stockholm in 2006-2011 was almost twenty times higher than in the general population, the mortality rates among persons in MMT in this period had not increased compared to those in treatment twenty years before. Their mortality increased significantly during periods off treatment, suggesting that changes in regulation to minimize the time off treatment would probably reduce the mortality rates among MMT clients.

SoRAD staff also investigated demographic and motivational patterns in at-risk gambling. Sundqvist et al. (2015) found an association between lifetime at-risk gambling and current (12 months) weekly binge drinking for both men and women. But after controlling for demographics this association no longer remained significant, so that the association thus in part reflected overlap in the demographic profiles of at-risk drinkers and gamblers. Further, differences in gambling motives depending on the respondent's main type of gambling, as well as according to the level of risk gambling were found (Sundqvist et al., 2016). Moderate risk gamblers played for the challenge and for coping reasons to a greater extent than low risk gamblers. The level of risk gambling is thus intertwined with motives for gambling. Examining the relation between personality traits and gambling, Sundqvist & Wennberg (2015) found that, taking age and gender into account, there were no differences in personality across game preference groups, though preferred game correlated with level of risk gambling.

In work including also tobacco use, a study of women who have been pregnant while committed to compulsory care in Sweden found that polydrug use is not only common but

rather the norm for persons with a substantial abuse of substances. Partner substance abuse and injection drug use were risk factors in terms of using several drugs concurrently. Another, sometimes overlooked issue, in relation to pregnant substance abusers was the fact that these women smoked, and smoked heavily (Reitan 2017a). At the population level in Australia, Finland, Norway and Sweden, Reitan and Callinan (2017b) observed a clear and partly increasing divide between age groups in terms of daily smoking among women in general and smoking in late pregnancy among pregnant women. Smoking rates among young pregnant women give particular cause for concern (Reitan & Callinan 2017).

While the focus in this theme has been on research on patterns in Sweden, SoRAD's work in this area has had a strong international aspect, with collaborative work analysing patterns and trends in Europe and globally, in Nordic collaborations, EU projects such as ALICE RAP, and work with the World Health Organization and on alcohol in the Global Burden of Disease..

When it comes to motives, mechanisms and underlying factors behind smoking cessation among the Swedish population Sohlberg & Wennberg (20014) showed that there are gender sensitive factors regarding reasons for smoking, the choice of method quitting, and level of use of NRT.

2. Policies and their implications: The bases for alcohol, drug, tobacco and gambling policies are studied, as well as their concrete formulation and what their effects and consequences are. The research includes studies of both the discourse around and the practical effects of specific policy actions. Many of the studies have also included an international dimension or have had an international comparative aspect. Also included in this theme are studies of cultural and normative associations of alcohol and other substance use, including cross-cultural comparative studies.

SoRAD played the leading role in a four-site study of what happened when the Danish, Finnish and Swedish borders were opened to travellers' imports of alcohol from other EU countries, and alcohol taxes were lowered. Northern Sweden, at a distance from the affected borders, served as a control site for southern Sweden, Finland and Norway. The overall results were often contrary to expectations from the prior literature (Room et al., 2011); alcohol consumption did not increase in Denmark and southern Sweden, and increased in Finland's register data but not in survey data. Likewise, alcohol-attributable harms increased in Finnish register data, especially for those with low socio-economic status, but not in Finnish survey data, and there were few effects on alcohol-attributable harms in Denmark and southern Sweden. The general finding was that reducing price and increasing availability does not always increase alcohol consumption and harm; effects may be dampened particularly in affluent societies. Comparing in greater detail what changes occurred in northern and southern Sweden, Gustafsson (2010) found, contrary to expectations, that consumption and problems generally increased in the north, while consumption but not problems decreased in the south. On the basis of its results, her paper also raised questions about the dominant theory about changes in alcohol consumption and problems in a population, Skog's theory of collective drinking. In the wake of this work, SoRAD staff have led substantial conceptual debates in the literature about main determinants of change in alcohol consumption (Room et al., 2009; with 4 comments and a response, pp. 577-590), and

concerning potential adaptations of Skog's theories (Room & Livingston, 2017; with 3 comments).

More recently, SoRAD staff have been actively engaged in international collaborative research on what factors lie behind the decline in teenage and young adult drinking which has been occurring not only in Sweden but more broadly in many high income countries since the early to mid-2000s. A forthcoming multiauthored commentary (Pennay et al., 2018) describes the nature and breadth of the trend, and reflects on the environmental, social, and policy factors that have been proffered. Given the international scale of the trend, it is argued that a collaborative cross-cultural approach is needed, and that future research should be situated within a historical and generational perspective placing the trends in the context of a broader shift in adolescent behaviours.

Concerning drug policies, since 2007 SoRAD has built on a considerable history of conceptual analysis of assumptions underlying policy documents. For instance, Olsson (2008) noted the extent to which Swedish drug policies in the 1960s and 1970s had been constructed around cannabis as a manifestation of what was seen as a new and worrying youth culture, when the main problems from drugs in Sweden centred on opiate and amphetamine use. Examining ten Swedish policy documents in the period 1981-2011, Roumeliotis (2014) more recently found that there had been a marked shift in the 1990s in how the drug issue was constructed as a problem and what preventive measures should be taken. What used to be an issue of social exclusion that should be managed politically on a structural level now became a behavioural concern and a matter of liberal drug values. Values, then, were to be addressed by methods aimed at modifying individual behaviour. Drugs were now to be constructed as an expert problem, which tended to preclude classifying drugs as a political problem. Analysing Swedish symposia aimed at disseminating information about cannabis, Månsson & Ekendahl (2015) found an emphasis on characterising cannabis as a high-profile societal problem seen as necessitating prohibition, even in a globalised world that is increasingly dealing with cannabis in other terms.

Swedish tobacco policy since the early 1990s has been analysed by Cisneros Örnberg & Sohlberg (2012) as being rather more reactive than proactive, and as having been influenced by the World Health Organization, the European Union, the Nordic countries and various other stakeholders. Cisneros Örnberg (2013) also examined Swedish tobacco policies in the context both of Swedish drug policies and of EU tobacco policy, concluding that in continuing to defend the availability of snus (sucking tobacco with nitrosamines removed), tobacco policy may be seen as having been a "solitary case" in Swedish drug policies in its commitment to harm reduction.

Current developments in Swedish and Finnish gambling policies have been analysed by Cisneros Örnberg and colleagues (Cisneros Örnberg & Tammi 2011; Cisneros Örnberg & Hettne, 2018), in the context of general developments in EU countries. While many countries have given up or weakened their gambling monopolies in the face of the rise of commercial web-based gambling, in Finland and Sweden the liberalization trend was, at least temporarily, contested to safeguard the monopoly systems with an increased focus on gambling-related problems and an emphasis on consumer protection to tackle these problems.

In the context of participation in ALICE RAP and other EU-wide and international projects, SoRAD staff have been involved in a variety of studies of policy issues at cross-national and

international levels. Often, as in Cisneros Örnberg's analysis (2010) of alcohol traveller's allowances for alcohol importation in the EU, this has included analysis specifically of policy interactions on alcohol, tobacco, drugs or gambling between Sweden and the EU.

Other analyses have been at a more general level, including the global level. For instance, Cisneros Örnberg and Room (2014) draw on the available literature on the impact of tourists from high-income, high alcohol-consumption societies on the hosting low- and middle-income societies, finding that tourist heavy drinking has a substantial impact on many elements in the host society, increasing consumption levels particularly among young people working within the tourism sector. At a policy level, the article concludes that tourist industry interests have often successfully argued for a wider general availability of alcohol in the society, and provision for tourists has often served as an entry point in the society for the global alcohol industry. At a broader level, in the context of the EU ALICE RAP project, Room and Cisneros Örnberg (2014) compared the international governance of addictive commodities, focusing on structures and actions concerning drugs, pharmaceuticals, alcohol, tobacco and gambling. Both at a global level and within the EU, the authors find great disparity in governance of markets between different addictive substances and behaviours. While nonmedical use of psychoactive substances under international drug control treaties is subject to a strict prohibitory regime, alcohol and gambling are subject to no public health-oriented international regulation, and trade treaties and agreements have been used as instruments to weaken national and local control regimes. Tobacco and psychopharmaceuticals under prescription regimes are in intermediate positions. International trade and investment law has fairly systematically operated to undercut control for public health or in the public interest in all areas other than the drug prohibition treaties. It is concluded that there has been a tendency toward a Manichean system where an addictive commodity either is forbidden entirely or is subject to free-market rules with diminishing restrictions on the market and promotion.

A substantial tradition of studies at SoRAD has examined expectations and rules concerning drinking and other behaviours of interest as revealed in public health campaigns (e.g. Törrönen & Tryggvesson 2015), in media representations (e.g. Bogren 2011, Törrönen 2014) and in qualitative data from informants and focus groups (e.g. Simonen et al. 2014; Törrönen & Roumeliotis 2014). For example, in news stories that deal with gender differences the consumption of alcohol and psychotropics is often portrayed in a stereotypical way so that women's substance use is associated with reproduction and men's with violence. Social criticism is hardest of mothers or pregnant women who drink, and men who use drugs for antisocial or criminal purposes (Bogren 2011, 2013). The media perceived drinking during pregnancy as the most serious female alcohol problem in the 2000s (Roumeliotis & Törrönen 2014). Accordingly, the recent Swedish public health campaigns have targeted at pregnant women's drinking. Their analysis indicates (Törrönen & Tryggvesson 2015) that the campaigns extend the medical public health gaze to reach inside the female body and emphasize how easily fetal development can be disturbed. By making women's individual lifestyle choices both the cause of and solution to potential damage during fetal development, the campaigns make mothers solely responsible for the health status of the fetus. Campaigns bypass the responsibilities of partners and communities in preventing drinking during pregnancy.

While many studies have focused on Sweden, a substantial number have been comparative across cultures. For instance, Törrönen and Rolando (2017a) analysed retrospective memories of Italian, Swedish and Finnish childhood reactions to the drinking of family members, as told and shared in focus groups. The results suggest that in the Mediterranean drinking cultures, children develop a neutral and safe emotional contact with drinking. In intoxication-oriented drinking cultures, children's contact with adult drinking was more ambiguous: while festive drinking was always described positively in Italy, in Finland and Sweden both positive and negative experiences are described. Another focus-group study in the same three societies (Törrönen et al., 2017) explored expressions of masculinity and femininity with regard to drinking, in responses to a set of pictures representing different kinds of drinking places and situations. The answers suggested a flexibility in doing gender in connection with drinking, and the possibility of challenging conventional gender performances. Masculinities and femininities seem to change shape depending on how the place is seen in terms of a drinking space or situation. Thus the doing, modifying and unlinking of masculinities and femininities varied by geographical area, age and/or education, as well as by drinking situation.

Furthermore, Törrönen and Rolando (2017b) analysed how the norms related to female drinking changed in Sweden, Finland and Italy from the 1960s to the 2000s by using advertisements from major women's magazines. The results show that even though women's acceptable drinking identities expanded from the private sphere to multiple new public areas and activities in these countries, the traditional gender norms were not disintegrated and replaced by equal gender norms. Rather, traditional hierarchic gender norms continued to be reproduced with varying nuances in alcohol-related advertising.

3. Societal reactions, treatment and recovery processes. This includes analysis of definitions of and reactions to misuse and dependence and how these develop over time; treatment systems studies -- social and ecological studies of treatment and other agencies for misuse and dependence care; and studies of processes of recovery from misuse and dependence and of individual and contextual supports for this.

Sweden has substantial treatment systems for alcohol and drug problems, located in three separate societal response systems -- welfare, health, and criminal justice. Apart from the specialised systems, these general societal response systems deal with large numbers of cases with tobacco, alcohol or drug or gambling problems. In this stream of research, SoRAD staff examine popular and professional definitions of the problems and preferences for handling them, sometimes in a comparative frame with data from other societies, and the formation and fate of policy responses to provide treatment or other assistance to those in trouble. Such studies are of substantial practical importance to policymaking to respond to potential and actual misuse and dependence in Swedish society.

A series of studies have compared attitudes on the addictiveness of and recovery from different substances or behaviours. In one study (Blomqvist, 2012), respondents to a representative population survey were asked to rate four psychoactive substances (tobacco, alcohol, cannabis and 'hard' drugs) with regard to their harmfulness to society and addictiveness, as well as the options for recovery -- with and without treatment -- in case of addiction. Although the biggest differences in perceptions were between various substances

and addictions, there were also interesting differences by respondents' experiences and characteristics. Thus, for example, women and respondents with no personal substance use experiences tend to play up the severity and addictiveness of most substances, and to play down the options for untreated recovery from an addiction. There was a tendency to exaggerate hazards and risks for habits that are perceived as unfamiliar and alien, while risky users dwell on a hope of being able to quit.

A study by Samuelsson et al. (2013) measured and compared the attitudes of addiction care professionals in Stockholm in the health, welfare and criminal justice systems on the severity of nine substance use addictions as societal problems, the risk of addiction to each set of behaviours, the possibilities for self-change and the perceived significance of professional treatment in finding a solution. Images of addiction proved to vary greatly. Addictions to hard drugs were judged to be very dangerous to society, highly addictive and very hard to quit, while smoking and use of snus were seen more as bad habits than as real addictions. There were some consistent differences in responses between respondents from different parts of the treatment system. Social services personnel had a somewhat greater belief in self-change; professionals in the criminal care system were more pessimistic about change and had a higher perception of risk; and there was a stronger emphasis on the necessity of treatment among medical staff.

A focus-group study analyzed addiction care practitioners' constructions of substance use and treatment needs in relation to gender (Samuelsson, 2015). Women were constructed as being different from men in psychological, social, and biological respects. The practitioners related to gender in addiction care as an ideological dilemma resulting from the contradictory ideals of treating everybody equally while giving special attention to what were regarded as women's needs. It is concluded that, in order to avoid potentially stereotyped treatment, a gender-sensitive approach should acknowledge the variety of ways in which femininity and masculinity may be performed.

The Swedish system of compulsory care for substance abuse is relatively extensive and deviates from many other countries by being part of the social welfare system and not the mental health system. In a comparative study of the Swedish compulsory care legislation for substance abuse and psychiatric care respectively, Reitan (2016b) describes and compares the legislative and other structural arrangements for compulsory care in outpatient settings. In compulsory care for substance abusers all clients are in principle expected to or offered care in outpatient services during the period of commitment. In the mental health system this is a relatively new option used by a relatively small percentage of all patients committed to compulsory psychiatric care.

Apart from this comparison between legislative structures in the substance abuse area and the mental health area, Reitan has published a number of studies on women who have been pregnant while in connection with commitment to compulsory care. According to the present legislation, pregnancy and the situation of the unborn child are not legitimate grounds for committing a woman to compulsory care. The government did suggest an amendment to the law in this direction in 2009, but the proposal was not taken any further due to strong criticism. However, as shown in Reitan (2016a) the social welfare boards do make such arguments when applying for compulsory care to the courts. More interestingly, perhaps, the courts themselves also make such references when justifying their decisions (2017b). As it is

only the mother's need for care and risks that are to be assessed both social welfare boards and courts will often refer to the prospect of indirect harm, i.e. that the woman's mental health status is at great risk if she by abusing substances becomes the cause of harm to her child. In Reitan (2017c) the organization of courts and court procedures is scrutinized. In compulsory care cases clients are urged to participate in court hearings in order to increase clients influence. As shown in the study, being present in court increases the risk that courts will consider the "belly" in court rulings.

A paper by Blomqvist et al. (2014) used general population survey data to compare how the general public in Sweden, Finland, and Canada appraise four generically different approaches to dealing with substance use problems, as these are applied to problem use of alcohol, cannabis, heroin, and cigarettes. Respondents were asked for preferences among four basic "models of helping and coping", as outlined by Brickman and colleagues in 1982, for different addictions -- to cigarettes, alcohol, cannabis, and "hard" drugs. There were large differences in how the general public understands the proper way of handling the four types of addiction; addiction to "hard" drugs is predominantly perceived as a matter for expert treatment, whereas addiction to cigarettes is more often perceived as a bad habit which the user is able to break on her/his own. There was some variation between countries in the popularity of different handling models, with Swedes somewhat more in favour than others of "expert" handling of cannabis, but less in favour of expert handling of cigarette addiction.

Storbjörk (2014) studied how stakeholders reacted to a far-reaching concrete proposal in 2011 to change the nature and auspices of the Swedish substance abuse treatment systems. The proposal was for the treatment responsibility to be transferred from the municipal social services to the regional-level health care system; and that compulsory treatment in its present form (assessed and paid for by social services, while being run by the state) should be abolished and become incorporated into coercive psychiatric care provided by the health care system. In written comments on the proposal, submitted to the Ministry of Health and Social Affairs by close to 200 stakeholders, a mixed response was found; critical voices in most groups, including social/medical professions and government bureaucracy, helped to block the shifts. It is concluded that reformations of subsystems like substance abuse treatment are difficult to carry out as freestanding projects within larger systems of social and health care.

Another paper (Eriksson & Edman, 2017) examined recent policy responses in Sweden concerning calls for regularisation of needle exchange programs (NEPs), on the basis of a strong evidence base in their favour. Previous research has found that policy makers often neglect to take such research evidence into account and hence fail to introduce such programs. The article studies the interplay between research-based knowledge, values, and policy making during 16 years of intense parliamentary debate in Sweden on the needle exchange issue. In 2000, the future of the two existing experimental NEPs was uncertain; in 2006, the regulations were reformed; and in 2015, they underwent a government inquiry. Both the reform and the inquiry aimed at regulating and expanding the programs. The study illustrates the central role that values play in a policy field which is repeatedly declared to be science-based. Within the overall framework of the Swedish drug policy ideology of a drug-free society, the advocates of NEPs framed drug misuse as a consequence of either an unjust society or a disease, arguing that because misuse is a condition beyond the control of the individual, the Swedish welfare state has an obligation to take care of those affected. For their part, the opponents framed drug misuse as a result of misguided attitudes, which would only

be corrected by restrictions and prohibition. In their view, NEPs are a tool for drug policy liberalization. In the debate between the two positions, research evidence played only a minor role.

A study of those in addiction treatment in Stockholm County (Storbjörk, 2012) explored how the circumstances of entering treatment – whether by self-choice or by pressures from others -- are associated with one-year treatment outcome among alcohol and drug misusers.

Informal pressures (from family and friends), formal pressures (related to work, healthcare, social services, social allowances, child custody) and legal pressures (related to the police, criminal justice system, compulsory treatment) were analysed. Controlling for background factors and severity, regression analyses indicated that self-choice and pressures are associated with outcome among alcohol misusers but not among drug misusers. Self-choice (without pressures) correlated with a good outcome (a lower number of dependence criteria), while pressures were generally associated with poorer outcome. Among alcohol misusers, those who had experienced threats regarding child custody did better.

SoRAD's research on the social handling of substance use and behavioural addiction problems has put Sweden in a leading position internationally in treatment systems research in the field. Research at this systemic level and on policies governing the development and interplay of the systems is of practical importance in terms of informing policymaking and decisions. It also makes an important contribution to the advancement of science, adding a crucial dimension to a research literature which has often focused solely on biological and individual levels, and on individual impulses and behaviour rather than on the social and societal responses which strongly influence developments and outcomes.

1b) Describe briefly the quality of the research in an international context (state of the art)

The Nordic countries, including Sweden, have traditionally had a strong international position in social and epidemiological research on alcohol. In recent years, the Swedish contribution to such research on drugs, tobacco and gambling has also become notable. The Centre of Excellence grant to SoRAD has contributed significantly to strengthening this position.

In the first theme of the Centre, epidemiological and social science studies of use and problems, SoRAD has on the one hand extended a tradition of detailed work on patterns in the Swedish population to a wider range of substance use and behavioural problems, and on the other has played a leading role in collaborative cross-national work and analysis, for instance in the burgeoning field of age-period-cohort analyses.

SoRAD has contributed substantially in its work for the Centre to the strong Nordic tradition of studies of alcohol policies and their implications, and has also led in developing critical policy analyses concerning drugs, tobacco and gambling. In terms of studies of norms and social practices and their interplay with policies, SoRAD researchers have developed and are at the international forefront in cultural studies analysing alcohol and the definition of normal and problematic drinking, not least from a gender perspective. Several innovative qualitative methods have been developed using, among other things, picture, self-biographies and other textual material, and focus group and other interview formats revealing changes in the

cultural position of alcohol in the society in general and among different groups. These lines of work have now been extended to studies of drug user groups and of social worlds of gambling, and have addressed the challenge of extending the techniques to cross-cultural comparisons.

In the third thematic area, SoRAD has played a leading role in taking research on popular perceptions of addiction and use problems into comparisons of attitudes and reactions across different substances and addictive behaviours, with interesting and important findings. Again, SoRAD staff have also played a strong role in adding a cross-national comparative aspect to such work. One of the most internationally notable aspects of SoRAD's work is its research on treatment system policies and on the functioning and interplay of treatment systems in the alcohol, drug and gambling fields, substantially remedying what has been a notable weakness in the research literature. Again, a substantial enhancement of SoRAD's work on Swedish treatment systems has been the comparative international studies in which its staff have played leading roles.

SoRAD's strong standing in an international context reflects a number of characteristics of its work. It has a relatively high publication rate of refereed articles. A number of papers have been published in peer-reviewed international journals, including the most highly ranked ones in this area such as *Addiction* and *International Journal of Epidemiology*. The number of SoRAD publications which are indexed in the Web of Science (WoS) database per year shows an up going trend, as do the percentage of peer-reviewed publications from SoRAD which are indexed in WoS. However, it should be noted that, since its inception, SoRAD, as a national research center, had a clear mission to communicate its research results not only to the academic world, but also to the general public and to policy makers. Subjects that have received high Altmetric Attention Score among SoRAD publications are for example studies on cannabis, tobacco and alcohol use among Swedish Men (Falkstedt et al., 2017, Danielsson et al 2015), work done in cooperation with KI, but also the interactional realities in seeking to change drinking cultures (Room, 2016).

Furthermore, SoRAD has a strong tradition of participating, and indeed playing an organising role, in cross-national comparative studies – within the Nordic context, in the context of the European Union, and more broadly internationally. It is a valued partner in such studies. The collaborations have often been initiated and sustained through a tradition of regular study and exchange visits with other research centres. Also a positive factor in SoRAD's standing has been the extension of its work across different problematic substances and behaviours, which has not only allowed application of insights from one literature to work in another, but has also increasingly included comparative analyses across problem areas. SoRAD's moves in this direction have anticipated and played a leading role in ongoing developments in the international research literature, in which comparative and synthetic studies across the behaviours and problems are coming to the fore.

1(c) Describe the role the centre has when researchers apply for different grants

The Centre has provided a stable intellectual and material basis for research work, a collegial group on which ideas can be tried and with which they can be developed, and continuing lines of work on which specific grant proposals can build. In part the contribution of the Centre comes prior to forming the initial ideas for the proposal: from new ideas emerging in conversations with visiting scholars or as part of ongoing Centre work, from relationships and interactions the Centre has with staff of governmental agencies, service institutions and other research groups, from previous connections with data-collecting agencies. Typically, a Centre researcher thinking about making a grant application will form ideas for it in conversations with colleagues and ask for comments on preliminary drafts. Ideas will be shared on the scope and design of the study, and on who should be invited to be involved in it. The Centre resources can often be used for a pilot study to try out a concept and collect preliminary data which can be used in the study proposal. An initial draft of the proposal will be shared with Centre colleagues, and difficult decisions discussed, such as the balance between a viable design with sufficient power and the need to limit fieldwork and other expenses. Often a proposal will be presented and discussed in a staff seminar. The Centre serves as an incubator in which research study ideas can be formed and developed. In this way the Centre of Excellence organization has provided an interdisciplinary research context offering support from idea to finished product including all necessary administrative and economic assistance as well.

1d) Describe briefly how the research can be developed after the grant period. What is your strategy for maintaining a strong research environment after the grant period?

Being the only national centre for research on alcohol and drugs within the field of Social Sciences, SoRAD is a unique research environment that since its establishment in 1999 has played an important role for the enhancement and exchange of knowledge between different research disciplines within this field. The maintenance and further development of the centre after the expiration of the Centre of Excellence program has been an issue of highest importance to Stockholm University. In the midterm evaluation it was stated that a main objective of Stockholm University is to support its leading research environments in order to further strengthen their international position, and that SoRAD, which was already a nationally prominent research environment, has been given by the grant the opportunity to develop considerably further in terms of excellence in its field. This development makes the Centre one of the most prominent and high-priority environments within the Faculty of Social Sciences at Stockholm university.

To offer a more secure and long-term position in economic terms and to increase the possibilities for a growing interdisciplinary research community, including teaching and more PhD positions, Stockholm University together with CHESS and SoRAD decided to merge the two research centres into a Department of Public Health Sciences at SU from 1st of January 2018. SoRAD and CHESS will continue to be internal Department centres solely focusing on their respectively research areas. The re-organisation has resulted in an even clearer commitment from Stockholm University centrally, both structurally and economically, when it comes to teaching and research regarding addictive substances and behaviours. Within the

frame of the new department, a 3-year strategic plan including both research and education has been initiated.

The new Department will still be a multidisciplinary environment with a strong research focus, but result in a larger entity of permanent staff. This will increase the possibilities for leading-edge research seminars and for gaining more input on research applications and ongoing research, and will offer better resources to work with communication and dissemination. Education at all levels will also ensure growth in the relevant research fields in the future. The integration of research with teaching and supervising PhD students is optimal for the renewal and development of theories and methods as well as for recruiting the next generation of specialist researchers.

The Centre will continue to combine basic research, where social theory as well as methodology are developed and utilised, with problem-oriented research by putting focus on research issues and questions of significant relevance to society. Problem-oriented and applied social alcohol research of high quality has a long history in Sweden and is recognised internationally. The same can be said about drug and gambling research, even if their history is considerably shorter. At the national level, interdisciplinary projects will continue with, for instance, different departments at Stockholm University, Karolinska Institutet, Gothenburg University with their Cera network, Lund University, and Höskolorna in Kalmar, Växjö and Malmö. On the Nordic level, the present close collaborations between SoRAD researchers and their counterparts in Finland, Denmark, Norway and Iceland will provide good opportunities for comparative research projects also in the future. At the global level, present arrangements for international cooperation with research groups in Australia, Germany, Great Britain, Poland, Italy, the US, and elsewhere will be continued, as well as work in European Union research consortia, and with global collaborative research projects under the auspices of the World Health Organization and other global agencies. SoRAD will continue with our national research networks Sonad and GARN, including annual meetings where junior and senior researchers discuss their ongoing work. The gambling field will be strengthened further by the present 6-year Forte financed research program REGAPS: Responding to and Reducing Gambling Problems Studies. Cisneros Örnberg, Director of SoRAD and Deputy Head of Department of the Department of Public Health Sciences, has also applied for funding for future joint Nordic workshops on gambling with Danish and Finnish counterparts.

We will of course also continue and develop the present cooperation not only between departments and universities but also with other organizations with a research focus such as CAN and STAD, with research and development activities on local level, and with state authorities such as The Public Health Agency, The National Board of Health and Welfare and The Swedish National Board of Institutional Care.

1e) Are there links to educational programs at the bachelor and master levels?

SoRAD is a research center without any history as an educational program per se. However, several of SoRAD's staff have taught and supervised courses and student at other institutions at Stockholm University, such as the Criminology Department, the Department of Social Work and the Department of Sociology. During the grant period, the staff also taught and

supervised at Karolinska Institutet, Jönköping University, Gothenburg University and Uppsala University. Furthermore, senior researchers at SoRAD have been supervising PhD students at Stockholm University, Linköping University, Gothenburg University and Karolinska Institutet. SoRAD has also received students from the Department of Sociology at Stockholm University on a number of occasions when doing their 10-week internship. This has on several occasions worked as a seedbed for future positions as research assistants and later PhD students.

1 f) Comment upon the previous evaluations of 2009 and 2011 and what has been done in accordance to the evaluators' suggestions.

The recommendations emanating from the first evaluation presented in 2009 were held relatively short. The main reason for this was that the time period between the actual start of the research program and the time of evaluation was short. This was due to a delay of the program start caused by a number of ambiguities regarding the continued funding of SoRAD, as the previous core grant from FAS was to be phased out. The responsibility to find a solution for the continued financing of SoRAD was primarily a matter for FAS and Stockholm University and thus beyond the control of the Centre. Nevertheless, the research activities at SoRAD continued as planned.

The specific recommendations made by the reviewers were the following: (a) to critically evaluate the organisational structure; (b) to formulate a research strategy making clear how to catch up with the delay caused by the slow start-up and (c) to appoint a scientific panel. The recommendations are shortly commented in the following.

The uncertainties concerning the organizational structure are to be seen in relation to the uncertainty prevailing at that moment regarding the continued funding of SoRAD. At the meeting held between FAS and the Center shortly after the evaluation report had been submitted, this issue was discussed. FAS then presented the opportunity to use the research grant as part of the long-term basic funding of SoRAD which, until then, had been perceived as disallowed by the conditions in the announcement text for the new centers of excellence funds. With this new information it was decided to organize a total integration between the centre and SoRAD (as, for example, had developed at CHESS).

The formulation of a research strategy to catch up with the initial delay was already underway as the evaluation report was delivered. We can note that the delay reported in the first evaluation was relatively quickly resolved. The strategic plan making this possible included a rapid recruitment process of new researchers; the fact that more employees than originally planned were financed through the grant or employed within the program as part of the co-financing from the university; by recruiting three instead of two postdocs as was originally planned; by making extra efforts to quickly search for new project funds linked to the activities of the Center; and, finally, by allocating an extra pot of 2.1 million SEK to the three research themes. This last step sped up the research process so that the initial delay would not have any residual effects in relation to the original plan. Parts of these measures were already described in the answers to the first evaluation and during the hearing which followed.

These strategic efforts more than succeeded in remedying the initial delay. SoRAD has been very successful in obtaining new external research grants, not least from FAS/Forte, but also from the Swedish Research Council and, in the last few years, two projects from the Riksbankens Jubileumsfond. Several PhD students and other junior and senior researchers were recruited and by this means, together with other efforts, e.g. by developing extensive international collaborations, the centre managed to achieve a high rate of publication as well as high scores in bibliometric analyses. The "productivity" thus did increase during the years of catching up. According to a report done by Stockholm university library, SoRAD had the second highest average of publications during the period 2007-2013 in its faculty. Overall, this clearly shows that the strategic work initiated worked well to overcome the initial delay.

The third recommendation was followed by appointing an international scientific committee consisting of three senior researchers whose expertise covered the three research themes. Ingeborg Rossow covered theme 1, Margareta Järvinen theme 2 and Mads Uffe Pedersen theme 3. Dr Rossow is a senior alcohol and drug epidemiologist who has made substantial contributions to the literature over many years. Professor Margaretha Järvinen has a strong record of alcohol research, including a series of qualitative youth drinking studies, and of policy studies such as a study of the operation and effects of a buyer surveillance system in state alcohol monopoly operations. Professor Pedersen has played a leading role in alcohol and drug treatment system research in the Nordic countries.

The evaluation of 2011 points at essentially three recommendations where improvements could be made. The centre could benefit by: (a) a more articulated and focused research strategy, (b) an effort to increase the number of publications in international journals, and (c) an effort to obtain external funds to attract more young postdoctoral researchers and PhD students.

SoRAD's research strategy has successfully addressed these recommendations. The daily work on this strategy has been done within the framework of the three research themes, under the guidance of a steering group comprised of senior researchers from each theme plus the management of SoRAD. The research strategy was also discussed twice a year among all staff members during SoRAD:s regular work planning meetings. The main issues developed in the strategy concerned coordination of the centre's sub-projects, developing research applications for external funding, national and international collaborations (including several EU-funded projects), work on improving project management among project leaders, strategic work around the centre's publication policy, and dissemination work oriented towards the scientific community as well as to the surrounding society.

Among other things, the strategic work of the centre had a positive impact on the number of publications in international journals. The bibliometric analyses done by Stockholm university library show that SoRAD has continuously been in the top layer of centres and departments of the social science faculty at the university (Ahlgren, 2014). According to a bibliometric analysis of the publications at the Faculty of Social Sciences between 2007-2013, SoRAD increased its publication points from 2.4 points in 2013 (place 3/22 within the faculty) to 2.9 points in 2014. At the same time, the centre has been aware of the original

task of SoRAD as a national institute which included a special responsibility to communicate with a Swedish audience through publications and other presentations in the Swedish language.

SoRAD and its Centre of Excellence also did well in obtaining external funds, both from national research councils and from international sources such as the EU. Again, SoRAD has scored high in comparison to other similar centres and departments at Stockholm University. During the grant period, twelve PhD students have been employed as well as numerous young postdocs and senior researchers. Three permanent lecturer positions were appointed in 2012.

1 g) What university policies relevant to the gender profile of those involved in the Forte Centre exist - particularly those related to its leadership? How have these policies been implemented in the centre?

SoRAD is guided by Stockholm University's Gender Equality Policy. The University aims to achieve equal rights of women and men with regard to studies, work, recruitment and other conditions of work as well as to development opportunities within the University. The University aspires to a balance between the sexes of 40-60 % in research and decision-making. Although the ultimate responsibility for achieving gender equality lies with the Vice-Chancellor, the concrete implementation of strategies for achieving gender equality takes place at the department and unit level.

During the grant period, SoRAD has had a gender-balanced board, during the last five years chaired by women (Ester Pollack and Lena Hübner). In 2012 Jenny Cisneros Örnberg took over as Director of SoRAD after Professor Börje Olsson. Her previous position as Deputy Director was then filled by Johan Edman.

When announcing positions as professors, SoRAD has followed the general recommendations from the university, making particular efforts to obtain the underrepresented sex and including in the call an invitation to persons belonging to the underrepresented sex to apply for employment. A strategy to increase the possibilities for women to become professors at SoRAD was also discussed when we announced the senior lecturer positions in 2011, where two out of the three hired were women. During the grant period, we have also had two female guest researchers.

1(h) Reflect on the pros and cons of Centre of Excellence grant. How do you perceive the Centre of Excellence grant? Is it a good way to finance research? If so, what is good with this type of grant?

In the case of SoRAD, the Centre of Excellence grant was extremely important since it was received at a time when previous funding ceased and our existence was called in question. We doubt that SoRAD would have remained in its present form without this grant. In the worlds of research in which SoRAD works, it is notable that a network of research centres – often national research centres for their topic -- is at the heart of the international collegium of researchers. Isolated or small groups of researchers and academics often make useful

contributions to the literature, but the field is sustained and primarily pushed forward by the work of the research centres. Means of financing such centres vary in different societies. Sometimes they are part or the whole of quasi-governmental institutes; occasionally they are financed by such means as bequests. But the most common current arrangement is for financing resembling that of the Centres of Excellence: funding as a research centre, carrying out a program of diverse projects, for a substantial period of time – at least five years. In our fields of work, at least, such a funding arrangement has proved to be the most productive in terms of pushing a field forward, and in terms of enhancing the national research reputation in the particular field.

In SoRAD's case, the Centre of excellence grant has meant that not only has a considerable amount of research been carried out, but there have also been several spin off effects, including recruitment of several young researchers (PhD's), recruitment of qualified researchers in the context of a post-doctoral program, a comprehensive system of visiting researchers, pursuit of new national research projects, and the initiation and setting up of several international collaborative projects.

On a general level we would like to highlight the positive aspects of long term funding, which first and foremost makes it possible to build a research program which functions as a platform from which long-term, well considered research can be conducted. It also contributes to continuity and in-depth knowledge. It also allows for support to projects or areas that are hard to get funding for or for which additional funding is needed. Long term funding, such as the Centre of Excellence grant, also allows for the strengthening of strong research environments, making it easier to implement a strategic employment policy and secure the addition of researchers to the field.

The main alternative methods of financing research are presumably the indefinite or permanent funding of a research centre, on the one hand, and shorter-term project and program grants, on the other hand. If a research centre is permanently funded, there might be a danger that its ideas and approaches will ossify over time. A time-limited Centre of Excellence grant provides a built-in timetable for reconsideration and potential reorientation or discontinuance. On the other hand, if a research program has to rely entirely on specific project grants, building such a program is a difficult and often impossible task. The end result of trying to do this is often a "contract shop" which zig-zags from one topic to another as available resources dictate, or else a relatively low-energy effort if research staff, for instance, find that budgeting requires that they give primary attention to teaching jobs. A Centre of Excellence grant thus provides surety, at least for its duration, that a continuing research program can be built and carried out.

2) Describe the impact of different types of collaborations, such as internal and external, and with different stakeholders.

Sorad is a well established center both nationally and internationally and has a good renom  and is often contacted for international cooperation. The Centre of Excellence program has contributed greatly to enable us to develop this even further. At European level, we have been involved in two major alcohol research projects funded through the Seventh Framework Programme. AMPHORA (Alcohol Measures for Public Health Research Alliance) and Alice

Rap (Addictions and Life Styles in Contemporary Europe. Reframing Addictions Project). The purpose of AMPHORA was to contribute new research into alcohol consumption and alcohol-related injuries in Europe and to disseminate knowledge to those involved in the development of policy for the development and implementation of more effective public health rules. The AMPHORA network comprised cooperation between about 50 researchers from 30 research institutions from all EU Member States. Alice Rap is economically completed, but still ongoing, European research project, also part-financed by the EU, aimed at stimulating debate on scientifically based policy responses to dependency issues. The project involved about 200 researchers from 25 countries and 29 different disciplines. About 10 scientists from SoRAD have been active in several Alice Rap areas and projects. The impact of the Alice Rap collaboration spans over several important fields, and has been reported to the European Commission. Further descriptions of the impact of the Alice Rap science, both in extensive and summary form, can be found on the projects home page <http://www.alicerap.eu/>

SoRAD staff members have been involved in several other international collaborative projects. The “Multi city study on quantities and financing behaviour of illicit drug consumption” explored the scope, structure and dynamics of illegal drug markets in several European main cities. An important aim of this project was also to initiate and develop drug research in Central and Eastern European countries, such as, Serbia, Rumania and Russia.

The Swedish retail Monopoly (Systembolaget) has constantly been on the political agenda and its proponents and critics have used different more or less well-founded arguments. To establish a solid knowledge base, SoRAD researchers and an international group of researchers analysed possible consequences of repealing the Swedish retail monopoly which have been used both in the political and media debate.

In current biomedical, social and psychological research there has been a great deal of controversy concerning the nature of addiction. The dominant view sees addiction as a disease triggered by the substance; others deny the usefulness of the concept altogether, focusing instead on availability of the substance. Intermediate positions see addiction either as a syndrome of varying degrees or as a behavioural pattern. These beliefs have implications for how problems could be prevented and how they are handled. To study these issues the IMAGES Research Consortium, led by professor Jan Blomqvist at SoRAD, was set up to research theories and images of addiction. It consisted of three partner projects in Finland, Canada, and Russia. Several studies have advanced scientific understanding of the addictive process, of the factors contributing to addiction as well as factors related to recovery. The results will have implications for prevention as well as for diagnostic and therapeutic practice.

The international project “Changes in the cultural position of drinking” led and coordinated by SoRAD, explored various aspects of alcohol and drinking in late-modern Western societies. The various studies undertaken by researchers from Sweden, Finland and Italy clearly show that changes in alcohol consumption and alcohol-related harm, as well as their regulation, are tied to two basic cultural phenomena – gender and drinking situations. The qualitative findings show that as women have entered drinking spaces, they have brought new influences into drinking cultures and made drinking patterns a more diverse phenomenon. These findings demonstrate that the development of effective public health interventions on

drinking should be based on an understanding on that how the masculinities and femininities of drinking vary by situation and intersect in particular ways with geographic cultural practices, social background and age. Another part of the project demonstrates that there have occurred a normalization of drinking and related harm in the population, in the sense that a larger share of all consumption and problems occurs among low and moderate consumers.

The Centre of Excellence program has also facilitated other activities. Important for any research center is collaboration, communication and dissemination of research results in the context of international conferences. Three main organizations and linked conferences have been especially important to the alcohol and drug fields. SoRAD members have been very active in all of them and also held important positions, for instance, as president and board members.

The Kettil Bruun Society (KBS) where SoRAD members played a leading role since its initiation. SoRAD was the main organizer together with CAN of the 2016 annual conference at Stockholm University. Over 200 alcohol researchers gathered for a full week of presentations and seminars. On the drug field, “The International Society for the Study of Drug Policy” (ISSDP) plays a role similar to the KBS, as it has developed to the world leading society of scholars committed to advancing drug policy research. The “European Society for Social Drug Research” (ESSD) plays a similar role as ISSDP on the European level. Its principal aim is to promote social science approaches (especially qualitative research) to drug research, with special reference to the situation in Europe. The annual conference in 2013, held in Stockholm, was organized by SoRAD.

The Centre of Excellence program has also facilitated cooperation in Nordic projects and led to collaboration with the Nordic Welfare Centre and research institutions in Denmark, Norway and Finland. Several Nordic collaborative projects have been initiated during the grant period, for example around the area of social cost of drugs, cross-border trade and gambling policy formation, but also several anthologies in the area of public health and social welfare. There have also been Nordic cooperation around graduate courses, for example mixed-methods in the field of alcohol and drugs.

On a national level, SoRAD is the host of two national research networks, one for alcohol and drug researchers (Sonad) and one for gambling researchers (GARN) with annual meetings where junior and senior researchers meet, present, and discuss ongoing research and future projects. One could argue that one of the mayor impacts of the GARN network is the new Forte program grant “Responding to and reducing Gambling Problems Study (REGAPS).

SoRAD has during the grant period had workshops and seminars together with for example The Center for Education and Research on Addiction (CERA) at the University of Gothenburg, and CAN (The Swedish Council for Information on Alcohol and Other Drugs). Individual researchers at SoRAD has also performed cross disciplinary research with other departments and research centres at Stockholm university such as Score (Stockholm Centre for Organizational Research), Department of Sociology, Social Work, History, Criminology, and Psychology to mention a few. Collaborating partners at other universities has been for example KI, Ersta Sköndal, Lund, Malmö, Göteborg, and Örebro.

SoRAD’s competence within our research field have resulted in national and international research cooperations, both as initiative from SoRAD and by invitation from other

institutions/organisations. Cooperations with actors outside academia such as municipalities, health care centres, practitioners working with alcohol and drug questions and agencies such as Public Health Agency and the National Board of Health and Welfare have made an impact on both research questions and results.

3. External communication/dissemination

3a) Describe your communication strategy

When it comes to communication, SoRAD relates to the central guidelines expressed in Stockholm University's communications policy. The policy establishes Stockholm University's views on the purpose and importance of communication, including responsibilities and roles in the communication process, target groups and channels. The University's mission is to communicate its core activities – education and research – as well as cooperation and collaboration with the surrounding community. The main purpose of external communication is to build trust and support for, as well as increase awareness of, the University's education and research. Each staff member is responsible for communications related to their own areas of responsibility, and questions from the media pertaining to research conducted at the University are referred to the researcher or team of researchers with expertise in the field (<https://www.su.se/rules/book-1/information-and-communication/communications-policy-and-procedure-for-communications-at-stockholm-university-1.17455>).

All new reports and other relevant information are subject to press releases through the university's press officer. Publications by the researchers are reported in Diva and then automatically on the website. Depending on the publisher's rules, some of the publications are available in full-text. Many of the published articles are also posted on our Facebook account for a larger and instant dissemination. Staff has gone through lectures in media training, and are encouraged to develop these skills. There is also a general policy that staff members should be open to media attention and to invitations from various stakeholders to lecture, participate in conferences or present research results in other ways. SoRAD has also an external seminar series open for the public.

3b) What efforts have been made to communicate/disseminate information about the activities and results from the research funded by the grant to different target groups? Please note that that this question does not seek to capture details of scientific presentations made to your peers in academia.

SoRAD's research activities have a character that is of interest far beyond the academy, e.g. among politicians, officials, practitioners, NGOs and the public. This means that we participate annually in a large number of lectures aimed at these groups. SoRAD researchers are engaged as lecturers and hold seminars on different topics within the fields of alcohol, drugs, tobacco and gambling, both nationally and internationally. SoRAD's staff also answer a considerable number of questions from the media, students, therapists, relatives and users by telephone and mail. SoRAD has a large volume of collaboration and cooperation, both in terms of research and education and participation in different contexts outside the university. Several of SoRAD's research projects include cooperation with various community institutions, for example, social services and addiction care facilities.

Nevertheless, one important target group is of course the research community and our research results have been disseminated mainly through the publication of articles in scientific journals, conference presentations nationally and internationally (see Appendix 5 for an overview) and through national and Nordic networks and workshops (for example GARN, Sonad, Cera, SAD, NorDAN and NADRA). Another important target group is of course students. Through teaching in several departments within and outside Stockholm University, knowledge about our research has been disseminated and new research questions have been raised. Some of SoRAD's publications are used as course readings. Interest in our research area is also increased by PhD students that recently have defended their thesis usually making a presentation at Stockholm university research day for college students.

A third important target group is the individuals and/or organisations actively involved in or affected by the research done. These have usually expressed interest in the research process and the results from our studies. SoRAD has arranged and attended several seminars targeted towards persons with alcohol, drug and/or gambling problems, and practitioners, mainly from social work but also health care personnel. In relation to SoRAD's gambling program, there have been collaborations with various actors (NGOs, treatment units, authorities) for planning elements of studies and recruitment of respondents. The same goes for several of our treatment studies within the alcohol- and drug field, where we also have an informal cooperation with municipal research and development units.

Furthermore, SoRAD has -- especially in the area of gambling and drugs -- a tight cooperation with authorities such as the Public Health Agency and the National Board of Health and Welfare, and SoRAD staff have been part of several reference groups as experts when discussing knowledge support, development of information material and writing reports.

3c) Describe how the results have been communicated/disseminated to the public, policy makers, research agencies, etc.

In addition to publications in scientific journals, SoRAD staff have contributed to several textbooks aimed at students and the interested public, for example SoRAD's own anthology in 2012, with a popular science focus on SoRAD research activities and two books on drug policy (see below). SoRAD staff also publish in popular science journals and blogs to reach a wider audience.

During the grant period, SoRAD has also recurrently been a referral body for investigations and draft reports on areas connected to alcohol, drugs, pharmaceuticals, tobacco and gambling. SoRAD staff has also participated as experts on official inquiries such as E-commerce and home delivery of alcoholic drinks to consumers (SOU 2014:58) and the investigation on internet-drugs and classification of new psychoactive substances (SOU 2016:93). Furthermore, the fact that several official inquiries have referred to reports done by SoRAD indicates an impact on policy development. SoRAD's research network for Swedish alcohol- and drug researchers, Sonad, had the Swedish Public Health Minister as an invited speaker with a following debate, which shows how much weight Swedish politicians put on these issues.

Other dissemination activities have included for example Forte TALKS, Forte's own conference. Last year the research areas of SoRAD and CHESS was presented for the GD of Forte with staff. We also have reoccurring communication, report and a few seminars together with the Research Council and Riksbankens jubileumsfond regarding ongoing projects. Yearly presentations have been made at the research seminars arranged by the state-owned alcohol and gambling monopolies, Systembolaget and Svenska Spel, both of which have research councils funding research within the alcohol and gambling field.

SoRAD staff often also present at national conferences aimed at practitioners within municipalities and healthcare, police and customs, with focus on treatment and prevention such as Drogfokus and Förebygg.nu.

To communicate our research to a brother public we also try to summarize publications of Nordic interest in the blog PopNAD and in popular journals such as *Alkohol och Narkotika*. We also use our web-page and facebook account to communicate our research.

3d) Please list impact through media e.g. newspapers, textbooks, popular science presentations, policies/standards, blogg, twitter and homepage.

SoRAD has since the midterm evaluation had a homepage in both Swedish and English with information about ongoing research, publications and staff to increase knowledge about ongoing research and increase communication with media and the public. Since January 1st 2018 SoRAD has, together with Chess, formed the Institution for Public Health Sciences, which now has a common homepage. SoRAD has the ambition to reach out with its research as much as possible, and as part of this, a Facebook page was launched in 2013. Continuous news from SoRAD is published, ranging from new scientific articles and reports to links where employees have been interviewed. This Facebook account now belongs to the new department, today with more than 400 followers.

The Monitoring project produced yearly SoRAD reports until 2012 on the total consumption of alcohol in Sweden, and on travelers' imports and smuggling of alcohol and tobacco. There has been a lot of media attention and sometimes debate around the figures presented. Effects of price increases on alcohol, snus and cigarettes in terms of smuggling and entry are a political issue that is being debated constantly and SoRAD's figures have formed the basis for political decisions.

Consumption patterns in certain groups such as young people, women, elderly and immigrants are also a topic well covered in both daily newspapers and radio, and SoRAD has been the main centre for answering these types of questions. Several of SoRAD's staff have also commented in the media on policy initiatives such as alcohol tax increases and decreases, alcohol policy in general, with a special focus on so-called farm sales, private import and alcohol advertising. Questions regarding public attitudes and changes in culture when it comes to alcohol and tobacco are also common. SoRAD's social cost of alcohol

studies offered a basis for discussions on the economic burden of alcohol consumption and different methods of making calculations.

SoRAD's research in the area of vulnerable groups as homeless people with drug problems has increased the awareness situation of these groups, often exposed to violence and with other health and psychological problems.

A more recent subject in the media has been the issue of gambling problems and gambling regulation, a research area of current interest since Sweden will abolish the gambling monopoly and introduce a licensing market on online gambling.

On the drug side, two textbooks have central in recent year's discussions of the reform of Swedish drug policy, especially the debate on harm reduction ("Dogmer som dödar", 2017 & "Narkotika som problem och politik, 2011). The books have also been used as course literature and thus made the subject central to academic education. SoRAD has also published several publications around the medical and social effects of cannabis and experiences of prevention, care and control policies, supporting the international debate about different substances' hazards levels and regulatory needs.

4b) Describe strategies for recruitment of researchers and research groups. Have the strategies been successful?

SoRAD follows the general guidelines for recruitment at Stockholm University, aimed at recruiting the most skilled employees. Recruiting qualified employees is one of the university's most important processes. A structured recruitment process based on a well-defined requirement profile, and following the interview manual and reference template, increases the ability to recruit the right people. The recruitment process takes place through the ReachMee system. Decisions to announce a position are always taken by the head of department. All applications are public acts and all applicants can appeal the decision.

During the grant period nine positions as PhD student have been announced, several of them under the broad theme of the Centre of Excellence such as alcohol and gender studies and drug policy. During the grant period, we also announced the first PhD student within the area of Gambling research at the centre, which has strengthened the center's competence in this area even further.

Out of the eight post-doc positions announced during the grant period, several received external funding and continued as researchers, and a few also as senior lecturers, at SoRAD after their post-doc period. This shows that the recruitment have been successful both when it comes to attracting people with high competence in receiving external funding in competition and also in offering an attractive workplace where people want to stay and build a career. Among applicants for positions at SoRAD, our international contacts and interdisciplinary environment has been highlighted.

In 2011 three positions as senior lecturer were appointed at SoRAD, two with a general focus on social alcohol and drug research and one with a specialization in consumption patterns

(theme 1). The announcements were made after consultation with the University vice-chancellor when it was found that there was a generation gap among alcohol and drug researchers and that younger senior researchers had to be recruited to ensure the growth of the Center and the research area. Two of the senior lecturers are still at SoRAD, and one is now promoted professor. With guest researchers such as Evy Gunnarsson has the focus on alcohol and elderly been developed and Mona Livholts contributed to SoRADs research on alcohol as an alibi for violence.

Finally, the CoE grant made it possible to recruit Professor Robin Room and Professor Ludwig Kraus, two internationally recognized researchers, with a broad competence within the field of all substances and addictive behaviors that SoRAD is covering. The two professors has offered SoRAD access to their broad network and data. Room has been especially important in the development of our international cooperations while Kraus' excellent knowledge in quantitative research methods have contributed to the expertise within this field, for instance comparative analysis of the European School surveys (ESPAD) data.
