

Course Description

Academic Writing in Psychology – 7,5 HP

Course content and aims

- This course gives doctoral students the opportunity to develop their academic writing skills within psychology or closely related fields. Topics covered include finding the time to write, how to structure an academic paper, how to improve their clarity and flow of writing, the publication and review process, and grant writing. The course will involve both lectures and seminars with weekly writing and reviewing assignments.
- The course is primarily intended for doctoral students in psychology who have research that is ready to be written for publication.

Expected learning outcomes

- Understand the process of writing and publishing an academic paper in psychology.
- Reflect on own strengths and weaknesses and strategies for overcoming challenges in the writing process.
- Understand and apply principles of writing that lead to more clear and engaging texts.
- Be able to give constructive feedback and respond to the feedback of others.

Assessment

- The course is graded pass/fail. A passing grade requires completion of all assignments as well as active participation in lectures and seminars. See below for details.
 - Writing samples: At the end of weeks 1-4, students will submit a sample of written work for peer review. With the sample, they should make clear what aspect of their writing they would like feedback on.
 - Peer review: Before class in weeks 2-5, students will review a peer's written work in both writing (,5-1 page; submitted on Athena before class) and through discussion (during class time).
 - Review reflections: After discussing the peer review and revising the written work, the student will write a brief reflection (,5 page) on the peer comments and how they were applied.
 - Active participation is required to pass the course. If a student cannot attend a seminar, they must book an alternate meeting time for a peer discussion. If they cannot attend a lecture, they must contact the course leader regarding a completion assignment.
- A note on AI: The use of AI for writing will be discussed in this course. Generative AI *can* be used to assist in your writing samples (*not* your peer review or review reflections), given that its use is disclosed and justified. If the justification is not sufficient, you may be asked to re-write an assignment. The use of AI without disclosure is considered academic dishonesty and will be reported.
