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Glossary

Admission to the Programme: The formal process by which a student is officially accepted into the Programme after meeting the required academic qualifications, submitting necessary documents, and fulfilling any additional criteria set by the institutions involved. Admission is confirmed through an official notification from the university with the issuing of an Acceptance Letter.

Programme board: The main decision-making body for the Programme.

Cohort: The group of students admitted and enrolled in the Programme in one intake. The cohort 2026 applies to all students admitted and enrolled in the programme starting in 2026.

Curriculum: The elements that make up a degree programme, including the structure, the content to be covered, intended learning outcomes, teaching, examination and assessment methods.

Degree: The academic qualification awarded by a university upon successful completion of the Programme. The degree certifies that the student has met all academic requirements, including coursework, research, final assessments and is officially recognised as having attained a specific level of expertise in their field of study defined by the intended learning outcomes of the Programme.

Degree Type: The type of master's degree (Master of Arts, Master of Science, International Master etc.) and the level of qualification it confers.

Diploma: The document/parchment presented to the student after successful completion of the programme according to the practices and regulations of the awarding university/-ies.

Diploma Supplement: The document that accompanies the diploma and provides the details of the academic programme and academic achievements.

European Credit Transfer and Accumulation System (ECTS): A standardised system used in European higher education to measure and compare students' workload and learning outcomes. One ECTS credit typically corresponds to 25–30 hours of study.

Issuing partner university: The university that issues the diploma.

Joint Degree: A single degree jointly awarded by universities to a student upon successful completion of a joint programme.

Multiple Degree: Separate degrees awarded by higher education institutions offering the joint programme attesting the successful completion of this programme.

Participation cost: The financial charges levied on students for their enrolment in the Programme.

Partner university: The university that awards a degree, as applicable with reference to the relevant format of awarded degree (joint, double or multiple).

Transcript of records: The official record or breakdown of a student's progress and achievements.

1 The programme

The master's programme in Transdisciplinary Studies of Climate, Environment, and Energy (TRACEE) is a collaborative initiative designed within the CIVIS Alliance. This innovative master's programme aims to equip students with transdisciplinary expertise to address the complex challenges of our time, focusing on climate, environment, and energy. It features an integrated curriculum co-created by scholars from CIVIS member universities that promote diverse academic perspectives across Europe and Africa. The vision, target group of students and intended learning outcomes are presented hereafter.

1.1 Vision

The vision which forms the foundation for this programme is for students with a solid disciplinary background in natural sciences, social sciences, law, or humanities to become transdisciplinary graduates capable of tackling the world's most pressing challenges—climate change, energy transitions, and environmental crises.

1.2 Target group of students

This programme is intended for students who are seeking (a) a career working at a local, regional, national, European or even global level on the ongoing societal transformation (e.g., as expressed by the European Green Deal), or (b) a future in transdisciplinary research focusing on climate, environment and/or energy.

1.3 Intended learning outcomes of the programme

The intended learning outcomes of the programme are listed below. They are complemented by additional learning goals in each study track, which are presented in the respective annex for each study track.

Knowledge and understanding

- Demonstrate knowledge and understanding in Transdisciplinary Environmental Science, including both broad knowledge of the field and a considerable degree of specialised knowledge applied in the field of each study track and its transdisciplinary applications.
- Demonstrate insight into current research and development work within the specialised field of the study track and its transdisciplinary applications.
- Demonstrate methodological knowledge from the humanities, law, social sciences, and natural sciences applied to and relevant for Transdisciplinary Environmental Science.
- Demonstrate knowledge to use systems thinking as a framework for analysing climate, environment, and energy issues from perspectives of natural sciences, social sciences, law, and humanities, and transdisciplinarity.

Competence and skills

- Demonstrate the ability to critically and systematically integrate knowledge and to analyse, assess and deal with complex phenomena, issues and situations from perspectives of natural sciences, social sciences, law, and humanities, even with limited information.
- Demonstrate the ability to critically, independently, and creatively identify and formulate questions, to plan and carry out qualified tasks within given time frames using appropriately chosen methods, thereby contributing to the development of knowledge, and to evaluate one's own work.
- Demonstrate the ability to clearly present and discuss, both orally and in writing, conclusions and the knowledge and arguments underlying them in dialogue with various groups, in both national and international contexts.

- Demonstrate the skills required to participate in research and development work, or to work independently in other professional areas.

Judgement and approach

- Demonstrate the ability to make assessments in Transdisciplinary Environmental Science informed by relevant interdisciplinary, societal and ethical issues and to demonstrate awareness of ethical aspects of research and development work.
- Demonstrate insight into the possibilities and limitations of research, its role in society and the responsibility of the individual for how it is used.
- Demonstrate the ability to identify the personal need for further knowledge and take responsibility for their ongoing learning.

2 Programme structure overview

The TRACEE Master is delivered through the collaboration of 11 universities within the CIVIS Alliance where the credits of the master's programme are distributed according to the student's selected study path and integrated mobility.

2.1 Partner Universities

The programme results from a collaborative design within the CIVIS Alliance including the partners below and their respective acronym that will be used hereafter in the student handbook:

The CIVIS Alliance has six associate partners from African countries, these are: Makerere University in Uganda, Eduardo Mondlane University in Mozambique, Université Hassan II de Casablanca in Morocco, University of Sfax in Tunisia, Université Cheikh Anta Diop de Dakar in Senegal, and University of the Witwatersrand in South Africa. The six African partners may be involved in parts of the delivery of certain courses of the TRACEE master.

2.2 Distribution of the credits of the programme

The programme spans two academic years, structured into four semesters, each worth 30 credits, for a total of 120 credits in the European Credit Transfer and Accumulation System (ECTS).

The credits (ECTS) are distributed as follows:

- **The First Semester:** A Common Core (30 ECTS): The first semester is common to all students across the programme and takes place at Stockholm University. It consists of one mandatory course, co-created and co-delivered by teachers and scholars from across the CIVIS Alliance in Europe and Africa.
- **The Second and Third Semesters:** The Study Track (60 ECTS): After the first semester, students follow one of nine study tracks. Mobility paths are predefined for each study

track, specifying the partner universities where students will study during these semesters.

- **The Fourth Semester:** The master's thesis project (30 ECTS): The final semester is dedicated to a mandatory independent master's thesis project in transdisciplinary studies of climate, environment and energy. It is carried out at one of the CIVIS universities offering the selected study track.
- **The transdisciplinary stream:** The stream runs through the entire Programme. It is extra-curricular, meaning that credits are not awarded for participating in the stream. The stream aims at enhancing students' understanding of transdisciplinarity, maintains the coherence of the Programme and keeps the cohort of students connected throughout the entire duration of the programme, and provides preparation and support for the master's thesis project.

2.3 Mobility paths

Students select a specific study track upon application to the Programme and are required to complete their studies and to complete at least two mobilities to countries other than the student's country of residence at enrolment. Thus, mobility is an integral part of the Programme.

The table below illustrates the structure of the programme, including the specific mobility paths for each of the nine study tracks.

* For students selecting the study track 3 or 4 (ST3 and ST4), including Stockholm University (SU) in the study track, the country for Semester 4 (registration to the master's thesis project) must represent a second mobility in relation to the country of residence of the student at enrolment stage.

- Students in ST3 or ST4 residing in Sweden at the time of the application should be admitted to the University of Bucharest (UB) in Semester 4.
- Students in ST3 residing in Spain at the time of the application should be admitted to the University of Bucharest (UB) in Semester 4.
- Students in ST4 residing in Germany at the time of the application should be admitted to the University of Bucharest (UB) in Semester 4.
- Students in ST3 residing elsewhere in the world (outside Sweden or Spain) can register either at Stockholm University (SU), the Autonomous University of Madrid (UAM) or the University of Bucharest (UB) in Semester 4.
- Students in ST4 residing elsewhere in the world (outside Sweden or Germany) can register either at Stockholm University (SU), the Eberhard Karls University of Tübingen (UT) or the University of Bucharest (UB) in Semester 4.

* For ST3, students residing in Sweden or Spain at enrolment should be admitted to UB for Semester 4. Other students may be allocated to SU or UB, subject to the thesis allocation procedure and final approval.

3 Programme content overview

The programme content overview provides a description for each semester and the transdisciplinary stream that runs through the entire programme. Complementary information for each study track is available in the respective annexes.

3.1 The first semester – The common core

The programme begins with a common semester for the programme. It consists of one single mandatory 30 ECTS course, Climate, Environment, and Energy – a Transdisciplinary Perspective. The course will be hosted by the Department of Environmental Science at Stockholm University. It is co-created and co-taught by educators from across the CIVIS Alliance in Europe and Africa. This course consists of five modules. The first module (Systems Thinking) uses the concept of systems to set the stage for interdisciplinary learning. The second, third and fourth modules examine climate, environment and energy from natural science, social science and humanities perspectives. The fifth module (Creating Knowledge Through Transdisciplinary Methods) introduces transdisciplinary learning. The learning goals for each of these parts are as follows:

Part 1. Systems Thinking, 3 ECTS

- Discuss systems thinking and its history, central system concepts, as well as types of systems and their properties.

Part 2. Climate, Environment, and Energy - A Natural Science Perspective, 9 ECTS

- Describe energy and matter and their transfer within the Earth's system, as well as solutions for future energy supply.
- Describe global biogeochemical cycles, ecosystem services, and biodiversity, as well as the risks they face due to global environmental changes.
- Explain the climate system, drivers and feedback mechanisms, as well as Earth's past, present, and future climate.

Part 3. Climate, Environment, and Energy - A Social Science Perspective, 9 ECTS

- Describe past, present, and future economics, politics, and policies on energy systems, environment, and climate change.
- Discuss the international, European, and national legal framework for climate, environmental, and energy policies and the transition.
- Discuss knowledge, behaviour and action in relation to climate change, as well as the role of communication and education in addressing environmental and climate challenges.

Part 4. Climate, Environment, and Energy - A Humanities Perspective, 6 ECTS

- Discuss historical, literary, aesthetic, and philosophical aspects of environmental thinking and address concerns about climate and the environment.
- Analyse sociocultural paradigms and rhetorical strategies in climate and environmental communication.

Part 5. Creating Knowledge Through Transdisciplinary Methods, 3 ECTS

- Describe methods for involving society in different cultural contexts for knowledge generation and case studies of transdisciplinary research.

3.2 The second and third semester – The Study Track

The second and third semester are the disciplinary or transdisciplinary study tracks selected by the students, reflecting their different backgrounds.

3.2.1 Study Track 1: Environmental Humanities and Law

The study track Environmental Humanities and Law provides students with in-depth knowledge of the disciplines involved in the development of profound, lasting, and sustainable solutions to climate change, energy transition and environmental problems. Students will study various disciplines that inform the development, adoption, and implementation of mitigation and adaptation measures to climate change, energy transition, and environmental issues that meet the political, economic, legal, societal, ethical and communication challenges and must be taken into account for developing lasting and sustainable solutions. At the end of the study track, students will have obtained knowledge on the perspectives from different disciplines that facilitate dialogue with and understanding of the positions of the different stakeholders. Students will have acquired skills to develop and implement solutions to the problems that climate change, energy transition, and environmental degradation pose to societies.

The intended learning outcomes and the details of the curriculum are available in the annexe dedicated to the study track 1.

Study Track 2: Environmental Social Sciences

The study track Environmental Social Sciences provide an in-depth understanding of the intricacies of the socio-ecological transformations, many of which are related to climate change, in a globalised world. Students will acquire the theoretical approach to socio and physical science research, together with a series of specific skills to tackle the environmental and societal challenges of sustainable development in the Anthropocene. The students will have the great opportunity to develop practical experiences in the compulsory placement course, working in governmental bodies, activist and community sectors. The research-led teaching that both Universities offer will prepare the students to confidently use the sociological lens to understand and investigate climate change and socio-ecological transformations and to envision sustainable and effective solutions for local, regional and global communities.

The intended learning outcomes and the details of the curriculum are available in the annexe dedicated to the study track 2.

3.2.2 Study Track 3: Energy and Matter

The study track Energy and Matter equips students with advanced expertise in sustainable energy storage, conversion, and chemistry applications essential for renewable energy systems. Through modules energy conversion, storage and sustainable chemistry, students develop the technical and theoretical skills needed to innovate within the fields of energy storage, clean energy production, and environmentally focused chemistry. This track aims to prepare students for innovative roles in renewable energy systems by equipping them with both the technical skills and practical experience necessary to address energy challenges across various sectors.

The intended learning outcomes and the details of the curriculum are available in the annexe dedicated to the study track 3.

3.2.3 Study Track 4: Environmental Chemistry and Toxicology

The study track Environmental Chemistry and Toxicology is focusing on the evaluation and solution of problems in the environment related to chemicals. Apart from theoretical studies, this study track also involves laboratory training in both chemistry and toxicology as well as field work where students will be trained in relevant sampling techniques. The Study Track aims for a comprehensive understanding of the linkages between physical, chemical, and biological process mechanisms. Students from various science backgrounds will learn to qualitatively and quantitatively address complex processes in soils, water and air as well as in organisms. In addition, students will address the ethical, legal, and regulatory frameworks governing environmental protection, chemical safety, and toxicology and to evaluate environmental risks based on multi-disciplinary approaches.

The intended learning outcomes and the details of the curriculum are available in the annexe dedicated to the study track 4.

3.2.4 Study Track 5: Environmental Geoscience

The study track Environmental Geoscience combines the study of the fundamentals and applied aspects of geoscience to develop skills required to implement sustainable environmental solutions to global challenges. Using a variety of pedagogical approaches, all driven by the most up-to-date research in the field of environmental sustainability, the programme will provide students with a command of the relevant scientific knowledge, digital tools and innovative technologies to empower them to develop solutions to environmental

challenges. The students will have the opportunity to tailor their studies to their specific needs and aspiration, including an in-depth knowledge of techniques used to investigate, monitor and predict, using numerical modelling, environmental hazards and risks. This programme is particularly suitable for students that are interested the most up-to-date science and technology to solve geo-environmental problems for their future career and/or for further studies. It aims to develop the ability to understand and address environmental changes through a solid scientific foundation, adaptive strategies, transdisciplinary research, and technological skills, fostering a just transition and societal resilience.

The intended learning outcomes and the details of the curriculum are available in the annexe dedicated to the study track 5.

3.2.5 Study Track 6: Climate Change Science

The study track Climate Change Science lets the student acquire a comprehensive understanding of the climate system, including past and present climate variability as well as ongoing climate change. They will gain focussed knowledge about how climate is studied using remote sensing atmospheric and climate science and geophysics, ecosystem responses and feedback, as well as vegetation and soils in the climate system. Extending beyond the natural sciences, students will learn about sustainability in its broader sense (including renewable energies), and about climate policies. Students will apply the multi-disciplinary skills they have learned about in the study track by conducting a research internship project in climate science.

The intended learning outcomes and the details of the curriculum are available in the annexe dedicated to the study track 6.

3.2.6 Study Track 7: Environmental Risk and Mitigation

The study track in Environmental Risk and Mitigation provides a deep understanding of processes involved in Mountain and oceanic environments which are related to environmental hazard. Students will acquire advanced experience in field and laboratory methods and practice as well as theoretical approach to assess natural hazards, from the study of physical and chemical processes through to their management, via the quantification of their probability of occurrence in different conditions. The students will have the opportunity to develop theoretical understanding and practical experience in data acquisition, mapping analysis, modelling, monitoring methods, estimation of natural hazard and risk, its management warning systems development and evaluation of strategies for risk reduction.

The intended learning outcomes and the details of the curriculum are available in the annexe dedicated to the study track 7.

3.2.7 Study Track 8: Transdisciplinary Approaches to Climate Change

The study track Transdisciplinary Approaches to Climate Change provides students with in-depth understanding of underlying scientific issues as well as societal needs to develop climate warming solutions. Students will be introduced to various disciplines that inform the development, adoption and implementation of solutions to the problems posed by climate change, energy transition and environmental issues, based on the transdisciplinary knowledge on climate, energy and environment obtained in the first semester.

The intended learning outcomes and the details of the curriculum are available in the annexe dedicated to the study track 8.

3.2.8 Study Track 9: Global Change Biology

The study track in Global Change Biology equips students with a deep understanding of biodiversity, ecological interactions, and the impacts of global change on ecosystems. This track combines scientific theory with practical, field-based skills, preparing students to address complex environmental challenges using cutting-edge methods in biodiversity conservation and ecological analysis. The study track provides students with a well-rounded skill set in ecological research, statistical modelling, and project management, blending rigorous scientific training with hands-on experience.

The intended learning outcomes and the details of the curriculum are available in the annexe dedicated to the study track 9.

3.3 The fourth semester: The Master's thesis project

Each study track includes an obligatory 30 ECTS independent thesis in transdisciplinary studies of climate, environment and energy at a university within the CIVIS Alliance. This is offered as a single course or a combination of courses in accordance with university-specific regulations. Depending on the study track, the master's thesis project must be registered at a specific university within the Alliance, as described in the table below.

Students in each study track will be asked to indicate their preferred university for completing the fourth semester; however, placement at the preferred university cannot be guaranteed. The final decision will be made by the Programme Board.

The student must have received all credits from the first semester (30 ECTS) and a total of 30 ECTS from semester two and three as a balanced requirement to be registered for a master's thesis project.

The learning goals for the thesis are as follows:

- Plan a transdisciplinary project
- Carry out, document, and complete a transdisciplinary project within the allotted time
- Demonstrate experimental, field-based, or theoretical skills
- Evaluate, analyse, and draw conclusions from obtained results
- Read and comprehend primary literature in natural, social, and human sciences related to climate, environment, and/or energy, and apply necessary theories to the project
- Conduct goal-related, transdisciplinary literature reviews
- Compile and write a scientific report corresponding to the project's scope
- Communicate the project's results in a popular scientific format

3.4 The transdisciplinary stream

The stream will engage students in learning about transdisciplinarity, including its definitions and methods, while also providing support and checkpoints for developing independent projects. It will be offered on site during the first semester in Stockholm, and thereafter online.

The main purpose will be to provide students with the knowledge, understanding and skills required to undertake a transdisciplinary thesis in semester 4. Secondary aims include maintaining connection and support networks within the student cohort and providing an overall coherence to the master's programme.

The stream will consist of remote monthly meetings, each lasting 1.5 hours. These sessions will include a combination of guest lectures, discussion panels, networking sessions and student presentations. Guest speakers will be invited from a range of fields and sectors, with the aim being to demonstrate the importance of transdisciplinary thinking in different environments.

The sessions will evolve throughout the programme, with a slightly different focus in each semester. In the first semester, concepts will be introduced and students exposed to a range of ideas from guest speakers. During the second and third semesters, students will begin to select topics for their thesis projects, and the sessions will focus more strongly on helping them to develop their own ideas, forge connections with useful contacts, and establish how they can demonstrate transdisciplinarity in their own project. In the final semester, sessions will be almost entirely student-led, allowing them the opportunity to support one another while carrying out their projects.

4 Application and Admission

Stockholm University is coordinating the application to the TRACEE programme including the platform used for admission and the transfers related to participation cost and financial aid. The selection of the students receiving financial aid and admitted to the programme is made within the consortium via the Application and Scholarship Selection Committee (ASSC).

4.1 Admission Requirements and selection

The programme is open to students with a bachelor's degree in any discipline. This sets the entry requirements for the programme itself and for obligatory courses within the programme. The entry requirements for some elective semesters are discipline specific.

4.1.1 General Eligibility Criteria

Bachelor's degree

Academic qualifications from an internationally recognised university equivalent to a bachelor's degree.

Students in their final year of bachelor's studies can meet the requirement if they follow the instructions from University Admissions.

English proficiency

English proficiency equivalent to level B2 on the CEFR scale (Common European Framework of Reference for Languages).

Requirements can be met with an English test, for example an overall IELTS score of 6.5 or a TOEFL score of 90. Depending on the country of previous studies, the requirement can be completed during upper secondary or university studies.

4.1.2 Specific Eligibility Criteria

Admission requirements for each study track are as follows:

ST5: Environmental Geoscience	A Bachelor's degree within Earth Sciences, Geography or Environmental Sciences or equivalent
ST6: Climate Change Science	A Bachelor's degree within Natural Science, Engineering or equivalent including at least 6 ECTS in Physics, 6 ECTS in Geology, 6 ECTS Mathematics or Statistics
ST7: Environmental Risk and Mitigation	A Bachelor's degree within Natural Science or equivalent
ST8: Transdisciplinary Approaches to Climate Change	A Bachelor's degree or equivalent within any discipline (general requirement)
ST9: Global Change Biology	A Bachelor's degree within Natural Science or equivalent

4.2 Application fee

An application fee must be paid for individuals who are not citizens of countries of EU/EEA or Switzerland. The application fee is 900 SEK (Swedish kronor) and is paid directly to University Admissions in Sweden to have the application processed. Students pay one application fee for each intake semester they submit an application for in this system. Meaning that it doesn't matter how many courses, study tracks or programmes the student applied for that intake. If an eligible student was not admitted and decide to apply once again for another intake, the application fee should be paid again.

4.3 Participation Cost, mobility grant and other funding

TRACEE has a single participation cost, paid per semester, which is independent of the chosen study track. The full programme participation cost is €9,000 for students from the EU/EEA/Switzerland and €18,000 for students from outside the EU/EEA/Switzerland. This corresponds to €2,250 per semester for EU/EEA/Switzerland students and €4,500 per semester for non-EU/EEA/Switzerland students.

The participation cost covers compulsory academic activities, tuition/registration at the partner universities, student services related to the programme, and insurance arranged for the programme. It does not cover living expenses, accommodation, travel, visa or residence-permit costs, food, or other personal expenses. However, some additional costs may apply, depending on the study track, host university, country, or planned activities. Students should therefore check the study-track-specific information and follow the instructions provided by the relevant partner university.

Stockholm University collects the participation cost on behalf of the TRACEE consortium and transfers the relevant parts to the partner universities. Questions about payment of the participation cost should be addressed to the TRACEE coordination at Stockholm University.

Students are responsible for covering the costs connected to programme mobility, including travel and living costs in each host country. Eligible students can apply for an Erasmus+ student mobility grant during the first semester. The Erasmus+ mobility grant is intended to contribute to additional costs during mobility abroad and does not cover the full cost of participation, housing, travel, or living expenses.

The TRACEE programme currently does not offer tuition waivers or fully funded scholarships. Students may be eligible to apply for Erasmus+ mobility support for mobility periods outside Sweden, normally during semesters 2 and 3, but this grant does not cover the full participation cost, housing, travel, or living expenses. Students should therefore plan their finances carefully and are encouraged to explore external scholarships and funding opportunities..

4.4 Application period

Cohort-specific application dates are published on the official Stockholm University programme page. Applicants should check the current application period, document deadlines, and any payment deadlines that apply to their cohort.

4.5 Documents required for the application

The documents required for the application are:

- Transcript of records (in English)
- Diplomas or certificates of completed degrees.
- Curriculum Vitae
- Proof of English proficiency
- Scanned copy of ID or Passport
- Online application supplement (motivation letter)

4.6 Admission procedure

The admission procedure is managed by Stockholm University as the coordinating university for the master's programme in Transdisciplinary Studies in Climate, Energy and Environment.

Universityadmissions.se is the system that is used for admissions to higher education in Sweden and selected for the admission procedure of this programme. It is managed by the Swedish Council for Higher Education (UHR).

UHR manages the admissions process together with Stockholm University and is responsible for:

- The website Universityadmissions.se provided for the application
- Registering admissions documents submitted by students as part of their admissions application, such as transcripts and English test scores
- Reviewing applications to see that students meet general entry requirements
- Answering questions that students have about the admissions process
- Notifying students of their selection results in the courses and programmes they've applied for here at Universityadmissions.se

Students will be provided with the information and procedure to appeal decisions made regarding eligibility. The Higher Education Appeals Board (Överklagandenämnden) is the Swedish government agency that reviews appeals of specific types of decisions made by universities during the admissions process.

The evaluation criteria to rank the students is based on grades from the bachelor studies and the letter of motivation in the application with a proportion of 50:50.

4.7 Student agreement

Before starting the programme, each student and the TRACEE consortium will need to sign a two-party Student Agreement. The Student Agreement is a contract between the student and the programme. It aims to regulate the terms and conditions of the participation of the student in the Programme.

4.8 Enrolment

Students shall be admitted and registered as programme students at all universities within a study track, from day one of the programme, when possible.

5 Residence permit and Insurance

5.1 Residence permit

Students are responsible for ensuring that they have the correct residence permit, visa, registration certificate, or other immigration documentation required for each country in which they study during the programme. The partner universities provide information and support, but all decisions are made by the relevant national authorities. Visa and residence-permit costs are not included in the participation cost.

Students from outside the EU/EEA who will study in Sweden for more than three months normally need a residence permit for studies in Sweden. The application should generally be submitted before travelling to Sweden and must be granted before entry, unless other rules apply. Students who are required to pay the participation cost must have paid the first instalment before applying for the residence permit.

To be granted a Swedish residence permit for studies, students must meet the Swedish Migration Agency's requirements, including final admission to full-time studies, a valid passport, sufficient financial maintenance, and relevant insurance documentation. Students should always check the current requirements directly with the Swedish Migration Agency before applying.

As TRACEE is a two-year programme starting at Stockholm University, non-EU/EEA students are encouraged to apply for a Swedish residence permit covering the full study period, where this is possible. The Swedish Migration Agency may grant a permit for up to two years for studies at Stockholm University, but the permit period is always decided by the Swedish Migration Agency and cannot be longer than the study period or the validity of the student's passport.

EU/EEA citizens who are registered students at a Swedish university do not need to apply for a Swedish residence permit. Swiss citizens follow separate rules and must apply for a residence permit if they plan to stay in Sweden for longer than three months, but they may begin studying after arrival while the application is being processed.

For mobility semesters outside Sweden, students must follow the instructions from the host university and the competent national authorities in the relevant country. Requirements may differ depending on citizenship, residence-permit status, destination country, length of stay, and the type of study activity. Students should therefore check the official information well in advance of each mobility period. For mobility semesters at partner universities outside Sweden, students must follow the instructions from the host university and the competent national authorities. Requirements may differ depending on the student's citizenship, residence-permit status, destination country, length of stay, and type of study activity, for example if the mobility includes an internship or work placement. Students should check the official information well in advance of each mobility period, as regulations, procedures, and costs may change.

Semesters at PUs other than SU

All students are covered by Student OUT, provided by Kammarkollegiet and ordered by Stockholm University, during mobility periods at partner universities outside Sweden. Student OUT applies during studies or internships abroad, including travel between Sweden and the host country and the study period at the host university, according to its terms and conditions. 6 Examination

6.1 Examination and assessment

The students' academic performance is assessed according to the examination and assessment methods, criteria, and regulations of the university responsible for the course or part of the programme that is being assessed. More details can be found in each course syllabus of the respective university.

6.2 Grades

The grades received during the programme follow the local regulations at the university where the course is given. A comparison table is used for degree honours at some universities.

The course's grading criteria are handed out at the start of the courses in the official documentation of each involved university in the study track.

A passing final grade requires passing grades on all included parts of the course. The final grade of the course is determined by weighing the grades from all course parts, where each grade is weighed in relation to the scope of the course parts.

6.3 Retake an examination

Retake of examination follows the regulations of the university responsible for the course or part of the programme that is being assessed.

7 Academic Degree

Students will receive a degree from Stockholm University and from the universities involved in the respective study track. The process of issuing the diploma varies from university to university. Some universities will deliver a single degree certificate whereas others will deliver a joint degree certificate in the study track.

The details of the academic degree are detailed in the annex for each study track.

7.1 Transfer of credits

Before each university can issue a diploma, it needs to be ensured that all the credits of the curriculum are recorded at each university meaning that both the necessary courses and the transfer of credits are completed at each corresponding university.

The system of credits used in most of the CIVIS universities is the European Credit Transfer and Accumulation System (ECTS).

The University of Glasgow uses the Scottish Credit and Qualifications Framework (SCQF). The equivalence of credit points for the University of Glasgow with ECTS is done by multiplying the number of ECTS credits by two to convert to SCQF and by dividing the number of SCQF Credit Points by two to convert to ECTS.

To reach Frescati campus by metro (Tunnelbana) from the central station, take the red line towards Mörby Centrum and get off at Universitetet (The University). You can also explore other routes and plan your journey using Stockholm Public Transport (SL) online resources.

10.4 Finding your way on campus

11 The Study Track 7: Environmental Risk and Mitigation

The Study Track in Environmental Risk and Mitigation (ST7) provides a deep understanding of processes involved in Mountain and oceanic environments which are related to environmental hazard.

11.1 The vision of the study track

Students will acquire advanced experience in field and laboratory methods and practice, as well as a theoretical approach to assessing natural hazards and to define the best mitigation strategies. The programme offers training in the analysis of natural hazards from the study of physical and chemical processes through to their management via the quantification of their probability of occurrence in different conditions. The students will have the opportunity to develop theoretical understanding and practical experience in data acquisition, mapping analysis, modelling, monitoring methods, estimation of natural hazard and risk, its management, warning systems development, and evaluation of strategies for risk reduction.

11.2 Target group of students: Entry requirements

ST7 is intended for students with a bachelor's degree in Natural Science or equivalent.

11.3 Intended learning outcomes of the study track

In addition to the learning outcomes for the Programme, the student will, at the end of ST7, be able to:

- Demonstrate the ability to analyse natural hazards through an interdisciplinary approach that integrates abiotic and biotic components, utilizing the scientific method for practical and research-based investigations.
- Demonstrate the capability to evaluate natural hazards and associated risks across various environments, propose mitigation strategies, and address real-world conflicts related to natural resource management.
- Demonstrate effective communication skills to engage with stakeholders, decision-makers, and the scientific community, supporting informed decisions on natural hazard management and risk mitigation.
- Demonstrate the ability to learn independently, stay updated with innovations, and consider environmental, social, and ethical implications in natural hazard analysis through a transdisciplinary and globally aware perspective.

12 Structure overview of Study Track 7

The study track is divided in 4 semesters of 30 ECTS each for a total of 120 ECTS.

The study track takes place at Stockholm University (SU), University of Lausanne (UNIL) and Sapienza University of Rome (SUR).

- The first semester corresponds to the programme common core. It takes place in Stockholm in autumn and is described in the Student Handbook.
- Autumn semester 2026: 31 August 2026 – 17 January 2027
- The second semester is the first part of the study track specialisation in Environmental Risk and Mitigation. It takes place during the spring semester in Lausanne (UNIL)

14 Your semester at the University of Lausanne (UNIL)

14.1 Arrival and welcome activities

You are about to spend one semester of studies at the University of Lausanne and we look forward to welcoming you on campus.

A key point of contact for UNIL students is the [Social Affairs and Student Mobility Office \(SASME\)](#) as they offer support in various areas such as visas, residence permits, accommodation and insurance.

The SASME organises a **welcome day** for international exchange students each semester. Traditionally, this takes place the week before classes resume.

This event is an opportunity to find out more about the various services available at UNIL (the sports centre, library, language centre, learning French as a foreign language, etc.) and the faculty that will be hosting you for your exchange.

14.2 Visa and residence permit

14.2.1 Non-EU / non-EFTA students - entry into Switzerland

In order to enter Switzerland you must have a valid passport and, according to your nationality, a visa issued by a Swiss consular representation abroad.

Note that as a TRACEE student, you may possibly benefit from an easier procedure: with a student visa for a two-year programme obtained to start the TRACEE journey in Stockholm, and a valid temporary European residence permit delivered in Sweden, valid for the whole duration of your stay in Switzerland, no new visa application may be required to **enter** Switzerland. This is to verify early before moving to Switzerland, as soon as you obtain your student visa to go to Sweden.

Mind that a visa gives you permission to enter Switzerland but not permission to reside. Once you have your visa and have arrived in Switzerland, you will need to request a Residence permit. (See section on Residence permit below).

14.2.2 EU / EFTA students - entry into Switzerland

You must have a passport or valid identity card to study in Switzerland. If so, you do not need to complete any formalities before you arrive in Switzerland but **you must report your arrival to the Contrôle des habitants et bureau des étrangers** (Residents' office) **of the municipality where you live, in person, within 14 days upon arrival, this regardless of your nationality.** (See section on Residence permit below)

14.2.3 Residence permit

Within 14 days upon arrival in Switzerland, you will have to register with the authorities in the municipality where you live by reporting your arrival to the **Contrôle des habitants et bureau des étrangers (Residents' office)**, **most of the time in person**. On this occasion, you will be able to apply for a residence permit. The Contrôle des habitants will provide you with a list of the documents you need to prepare. It is important to be financially prepared, as the authorities will verify that you have a monthly budget of at least CHF 2,000. Please note that permission to enter Switzerland is not a guarantee to obtain a Residence permit.

Before you visit the Residents' office of the Municipality where you live, it is highly recommended to check their website (see below for a (non-exhaustive) list) or contact them to find out exactly which documents you need to provide. Requirements can vary from one municipality to another, and the list can be long.

Your application will be sent by the municipal office to the Cantonal office (Service de la Population du Canton de Vaud (SPOP)). Once your application is admitted, the SPOP will send you a letter with instructions to make an appointment with the Biometry Centre to enter your data for residence permit.

Note that there are fees for these procedures, of between CHF 15.- and CHF 30.- for the registration fee depending on the municipality you will live in, up to CHF 120.- for the residence permit fee and around CHF 20.- at the Biometry Centre.

14.3 Housing

We strongly recommend our students from abroad to focus their search towards student halls, private landlords or flat-sharing, because today's housing market situation in the region makes it difficult for people from abroad to rent from real estate agencies (especially if you are not yet in Switzerland), that impose constraints such as 1 to 3 months of rental guarantee, a work contract, a swiss guarantor, etc.

(Please note that the majority of apartments / studios (in the UNIL-EPFL database listed below as well) are managed by real estate agencies with the constraints listed above and not by the contact person who published the advertisement).

14.3.1 FMEL

The University of Lausanne works closely with the *Fondation Maisons pour Etudiants Lausanne* (FMEL <https://www.fmel.ch/en>), which welcomes over 3,500 students at 14 locations, mainly within the Lausanne urban area.

As far as possible, we try to secure accommodation for a part of our exchange students in an FMEL hall of residence. However, FMEL has a limited number of places available.

Once UNIL is informed that you have been admitted to TRACEE track 7 that is leading you to UNIL on Spring semester, we will let you know by the beginning of November preceding your arrival, whether we have been able to secure accommodation for you in an FMEL hall of residence. If so, we will contact you to explain how to proceed to confirm your accommodation.

You will be asked to pay a rent guarantee (see the "Rent guarantee" section under for more information) and your rent will be payable by you. Please note that the deadline for paying your rent guarantee to the FMEL is very short. It is therefore essential to check your e-mails frequently during this period.

(Note: in case you need to terminate your tenancy agreement with the FMEL, you must allow a two months' notice – for example, you must notify FMEL by 31 March to move out on 31 May.)

14.3.2 UNIL-EPFL Accommodation Database

In the case we have not been able to secure accommodation through FMEL for you, the University of Lausanne and the Ecole Polytechnique Fédérale de Lausanne (EPFL) run a joint accommodation database reserved exclusively to their students. Advertisements are published by individuals who want to let their accommodation or share a place.

If you don't yet have your UNIL credentials to log into the database before you arrive, the SASME office (logement@unil.ch) can send you regular updates of the rooms advertised on the list, as a PDF file. If an advertisement interests you, contact the person directly.

As far as possible, it is advisable to arrive in Lausanne a few days before classes begin to carry out your research and visit potential accommodations.

Please note that the accommodation listed on this platform has not been inspected by UNIL accommodation services. They have, however been checked particularly with regards to price and to try to identify any fake advertisements. Despite our best efforts we cannot ignore the possibility that a fake advertisement may slip through, given how cleverly they are written. Here are some tips to help you avoid any problems:

- Find out as much as you can about accommodation that seems too cheap compared with what else is available. For the sake of comparison, the average price of a room is around CHF 750 per month.
- As far as possible, visit the accommodation before you take out a tenancy and pay any advance rent or a security deposit.
- Never transfer money through funds transfer organizations such as Western Union or MoneyGram.
- If you are asked for a rent guarantee or initial rent payment, make the payment to an account held at a Swiss bank.

14.3.3 Rent guarantee

A rent guarantee (or deposit) is a sum of money, generally equivalent to three times your monthly rent, which must be deposited and blocked in a bank account at the request of a landlord (property company). The money can only be released and returned when you leave your accommodation, after the final inventory and statement of state of repair (agreed by the tenant and landlord at the end of the tenancy) has been signed, provided that you have not caused any damage to the accommodation and are not in arrears with your rent. Otherwise, the landlord can deduct the relevant amount from the sum deposited in the bank account, to pay for the repairs or cover unpaid rent.

Please note that a rent guarantee can represent a significant amount of money (for FMEL, allow CHF1,200). If you do not have sufficient funds to deposit this amount of money in a bank account, there are companies that can provide a guarantee on your behalf (Swisscaution, Firstcaution, etc.). To use this service, you will have to pay an annual contribution to the company providing the guarantee. Most landlords are willing to use companies of this kind. However, FMEL does not accept this type of guarantee.

14.4 Living expenses

The average budget for a student to live in Lausanne is around CHF 2,200 per month. Below is an indicative monthly budget.

<i>Type of expense</i>	<i>Average cost</i>
<i>Rent (excluding charges)</i>	CHF 700 - 1200.-
<i>Maintenance and food</i>	CHF 850 - 900.-
<i>Public transport</i>	CHF 55.-
<i>Administrative costs</i>	CHF 20.-
<i>Health and accident insurances</i>	CHF 80.-
<i>Leisure activities</i>	CHF 300.-

Note that upon arrival in Switzerland, you will have to pay various administrative costs, which can be fairly significant (visa and residence permit costs, local taxes, a rent guarantee for your accommodation, etc.). It is therefore important to allow for these in your budget.

14.5 Bank

As a foreign student, you can open a bank account for the period of time you will be living in Switzerland. When going to a bank, you will need your passport/identity card, a statement/certificate of residence issued by the municipal office where you live in Switzerland, and a certificate of registration as a student.

Note that some banks may refuse a request (in this case try another one) or ask for a large number of documents, depending on your nationality and how long you intend to stay (less than 6 months).

14.6 Public transport

The UNIL campus is in Dorigny, by the lakeside and around 10 minutes by metro from the centre of Lausanne. The campus is served by three **metro** stops on line M1 (UNIL-Chamberonne, UNIL-Mouline and UNIL-Sorge).

Individual tickets or a season pass can be purchased directly from the Transport Lausannois (TL) website <https://www.t-l.ch/en/home/>, via the mobile app or directly at the TL offices located in Le Flon Metro station.

Parking places on campus are limited and a fee is charged. Priority is given to students who live in areas that are further away and poorly served by public transport. You must register online before each semester. However, it is recommended to avoid travelling to UNIL by car.

Once you arrive in Switzerland, within 90 days of arrival, you will have to make sure your insurance coverage is in order:

- by presenting your insurance coverage (insurance Card) and your student card (Campus Card) or proof of studies (certificate of enrolment) to the Office Vaudois de l'Assurance Maladie (OVAM) <https://www.vd.ch/prestation/contacter-loffice-vaudois-de-lassurance-maladie-ovam> for exemption from affiliation to a Swiss insurance scheme.
- Register with the LAMal Common Institution (KVG) <https://www.kvg.org/en/contact/> which acts as a link between the care provider and the social security system in your country of origin.

CAUTION: In case your TRACEE insurance coverage was NOT sufficient for Swiss insurance authorities (OVAM), it is possible to take out specific insurance for foreign students at a reasonable price. See this link for more information:

15 Your semester at Sapienza University of Rome (SUR)

15.1 Arrival and welcome activities

To help you settle in at SUR, we run a **Welcome Week** in September and February fully dedicated to international students. We will help you find your way around, settle in, learn about your courses and faculty and make new friends. Detailed information on the [Welcome week agenda](#) and activities will be available on our website 2-3 weeks prior to your arrival.

The Hello Help Desk is a welcoming office providing in-depth and customised information to international students who wish to study, conduct research or participate in internships at Sapienza University. Hello provides also a first contact service that helps students in contacting the right offices and people. The Hello Help Desk is staffed by 100 Sapienza students from all around the world with an excellent knowledge of the English language. Students can request information on enrolment, undergraduate and graduate degrees, specialisation schools, PhDs, master courses, internships, individual courses and thesis research. The Hello helpdesk also organises visits of the University campus for international students. The Hello information desk fulfils its activities in the venue located under the dean's building porch. In order to benefit from the infodesk service you do not need an appointment.

15.2 Visa and residence permit

15.2.1 Visa and Customs

EU citizens do not need a visa to enter Italy. However, if your stay will be longer than three months, you will need to register at the Anagrafe of the Comune where you live. Non-EU citizens have to apply for a student visa at the Italian Embassy or Consulate in their home country. Please keep in mind that you can only apply for your visa after having received confirmation of your admission to the university. The full list of documents required for visa application is available on Italian Embassy websites and on the website of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs: (www.esteri.it/MAE/EN).

If you are travelling from a Schengen country, there is usually no passport control at the airport (in compliance with the Schengen agreement). If you are travelling from a non-Schengen country, you will undergo a passport and visa check. Please make sure you have all the required documents.

15.2.2 Airport Security

You may be stopped at the airport and asked additional security questions. If you encounter any problems on arrival or if you have any concerns regarding your passage through immigration/ passport control, please ask the Immigration Officer to contact Sapienza International Office by telephone (Tel. 06 4991 0789 From Monday to Friday, 9:00 am – 5:00 pm).

15.2.3 Residence permit

All non-EU citizens who intend to stay in Italy for longer than 3 months must apply for a residence permit within 8 working days from their arrival in Italy. Please note:

- This does not apply to students from a European Union member state (or EU equivalent states)
- If you lose your residence permit you will have to reapply following the instructions below.

How to Apply: Pick up a residence permit kit at any post office. There is one on the main campus by the Viale Regina Elena entrance or you can go to the main post office branches either at Piazza San Silvestro or Piazza Bologna (10 minute walk from the main campus). Complete the application form using a black pen and attach photocopies of the required documents along with 15 a tax revenue stamp (ask for a €16 *marca da bollo* at any tobacconist). Instructions are included in the residence permit Kit; however, if you are unsure or have any difficulties, you can ask for assistance at our International Office or at the HELLO Office.

Once you have completed your application form, you need to present it at the post office. On filling your application, you will have to pay around €130 (for the residence permit procedure). The post office will give you a receipt for your application, which is your proof of having applied for the residence permit and also indicates the date/time/place of your appointment with the Immigration Office (Police). You will have to go to the appointment to complete the application for your residence permit. For the first appointment, you must bring 4 passport-sized ID photos with a white background, one of which will be attached to your residence permit.

15.2.4 Tax code

The Tax code (*Codice Fiscale*) is an alphanumerical code based on your first name, family name and date and place of birth. It is used by the public administration to identify citizens living in Italy. Everyone living in Italy must have one. The Codice Fiscale is also necessary to apply for a residence permit, to open a bank account, to sign a rent agreement, to obtain a canteen card and for many other procedures/ activities.

You will be able to apply for your tax code directly on campus during the Welcome Week that is organised for incoming students. Should you not be able to attend the welcome event, you can apply at the Agenzia delle Entrate (Via Ippolito Nievo 36) when you arrive in Rome. Office Hours: Mon-Wed-Fri 7:50 am – 1:30 pm and Tues-Thurs 7:50 am – 3:30 pm The office is located about 500m from the Trastevere train station and can be reached with tram n. 8 or bus no. 3 or 780, getting off at the Piazza Ippolito Nievo stop.

The Italian Embassy/Consulate in your country of residence could also issue your tax code before your departure.

15.3 Housing

Sapienza University does not have student housing per se, but offers a series of affiliated housing agreements and recommendations. The Sapienza website provides constantly updated information on housing opportunities, rental agencies, etc. Private Accommodation On average, prices for a private room in a shared apartment range from €350 to € 550 (or higher) per month, depending on district/area. Please note that you will also be required to pay a 1-3 month deposit when you sign a contract. Always demand a signed receipt of payment, if it is not given to you.

15.4 Living expenses

Rome is not a cheap city, but it is much cheaper than many other European cities and there are plenty of reasonably priced and low-cost alternatives for students. Food is great and generally inexpensive, especially if you shop at a supermarket or local market stalls. Eating out, movies and other leisure activities are, again, less expensive than many other European capitals. A meal at a restaurant will vary depending on where and what you wish to have, but a pizza and a beer in a pizzeria costs about €10-15, unless of course you are in the heart of the tourist city centre! Public transportation in the city is also relatively cheap - €1.50 per journey - and much cheaper if you invest in a monthly or yearly pass. Trains are also far cheaper than in other European cities. Moreover, you can take advantage of a large range of student offers and discounts available at clubs, museums, sporting events, etc. Your greatest expense will be housing, depending on which area of Rome you choose.

On average, you will need at least €800-900/month to live in Rome. Although you only need proof of about €450/month to apply for your student VISA, please be warned that this is not enough to live in Rome.

A word of advice:

Do not make any advance payments from abroad. Make sure to meet with the person who is providing the accommodation when you arrive in Rome before making any payments and if you have any doubts do not hesitate to contact the Welcome Office for advice. To obtain a visa, you may require proof of accommodation (a receipt or letter attesting your accommodation). If this is the case, temporary accommodation at a hostel or bed and breakfast will provide you with the necessary proof without having to spend large amounts of money from abroad.

Unfortunately, due to the high demand for student housing in Rome, some landlords take advantage of the enormous influx of students by trying to rent their properties to students without an official rental contract. Clearly, this leaves the tenant unprotected and is illegal

under Italian law. Bill no. 23/2011 has made it easier to report dishonest landlords and force them to provide you with a legal contract.

Like any major city, Rome has its problems. Although it's a relatively secure city in terms of personal safety, you should pay special attention to your purse, wallet and other personal belongings when you are on public transport (buses, subway, trains, etc.). If you take a Taxi, make sure that the driver activates the meter and only charges you for correct supplements. These are all listed and detailed in Italian and English on laminated posters on the back seats of all taxis.

Should you lose or have your wallet stolen, you must go to a Police or Carabinieri station to file a declaration. Also don't forget to block your ATM card with your bank and any credit cards via phone or web.

15.5 Bank

You can open a bank account at any bank in Italy by presenting the following documents:

- Tax identification code (codice fiscale)
- Passport and Visa
- Letter of invitation/acceptance by host university (where applicable).

You can also choose to open a BancoPosta account at Poste Italiane (Italian Post Office). Unicredit bank and Poste Italiane have a branch at the Sapienza University main campus.

15.6 Public transport

Metrebus, Rome's public transport system, integrates a variety of different transport services: underground/tube, urban trains, buses and trams. There are several different types of Metrebus tickets that can be bought at ticket offices, newsagents, tabacconists and automatic machines in stations. You should not board public transport without a ticket. Please remember that you must always validate your ticket at the beginning of your journey and when transferring onto the metro (your ticket must be re-stamped within 100 minutes from the first validation stamp and is then valid until the end of your journey on the metro). It is only valid for one metro journey, but you can take more than one bus. You must keep your ticket with you while travelling on public transport and be ready to show it, on request, to ticket inspectors.

Types of Tickets:

BIT - Integrated Time Ticket: it costs € 1.50 and lasts 100 minutes from the initial validation; only one metro or train journey is permitted.

Daily Pass: it costs €7 and is valid for 24 hours from first validation for an unrestricted number of journeys.

Monthly Pass: it costs €35 and lasts for the calendar month, as printed on the pass, for one person for an unrestricted number of journeys; you can buy a monthly pass from any tabacconist and news agency up to the fifth day of each calendar month; starting on the sixth day of each month, the pass can only be purchased from ticket offices and ATAC sales points; the holder must complete the pass with his/her personal details. Holders must show their pass along with some form of ID to ticket inspectors.

Annual Pass: it costs €250 and is valid for 365 days from the date stamped on the pass; it can be purchased at any ATAC ticket office by filling out the forms and attaching a passport photograph.

Taxis in Rome are white. They have an identification name and number on the front door and all have meters. They can be easily found in every part of the city at special taxi stops or you can call one of the numerous radio-taxi companies at: 06 3570, 06 6645, 06 8822, 06 4157, 06 4994 or 06 5551.

15.8 Student health

Upon arrival in Italy, all international students must prove adequate health coverage. EU citizens and non-EU citizens access healthcare differently. In Italy, assistance, registration and activation of health coverage are provided by ASL (Aziende Sanitarie Locali).

EU citizens can access medical services in Italy and all EU countries with their European Health Insurance Card (or E106 form). The EHIC allows free access to general practitioners, hospitals and A&E services (including surgical services). A co-payment is required for specific examinations or specialist visits.

Non-EU citizens must have private health insurance with specific requirements, approved by the Consulate/Embassy issuing the visa. Alternatively, they may choose to register with the Italian National Health Service (Italian acronym SSN) by paying a fee. The registration fee is to be paid by postal order addressed to: "Amministrazione P.T. - contributo Servizio Sanitario Nazionale", C/C number 370007", inserting the reason for payment in Italian "Iscrizione volontaria al Servizio Sanitario Nazionale" (Voluntary registration with the National Health Service). Once the payment has been made, you can register with the nearest ASL by presenting the following documents:

- Certificate of residence (or self-certification)
- Valid ID card/passport
- Tax code (codice fiscale)
- University enrolment certificate (or self-certification)

What to do in case of a medical emergency

Call the free number 118 (ambulance) or go to the nearest hospital or "guardia medica" (out-of-hours service doctor). At the A&E, the patient is colour-coded according to the severity of their situation (in order of severity: red, yellow, green, white), which determines the priority with which they will be treated. In the case of a white code, waiting times can be very long.

For minor health problems, it is advisable to contact your GP directly. If necessary, they will refer you to a specialist check-up and provide you with the required documentation. To book an appointment for a specialist examination, call the toll-free number 80 33 33 (CUP - Centro Unico Prenotazione) and tell them which service your GP requires.

Remember always to carry your health/insurance card (tessera/assicurazione sanitaria) and your residence permit.

15.9.1 Libraries

With 6,000 seats, Sapienza's 46 libraries provide you with the largest university library holdings in Italy, made out of 2.7 million books and scientific journals, supported by around 160 librarians. And if you want to stay at home, by accessing online, you can read over 20,000 ebooks and more than 44,000 electronic journals and consult more than 170 databases for research. But there is much more: reading rooms open even at night, computer stations, courses on how to carry out bibliographic research or compile a bibliography, cultural activities such as book clubs, bibliographic exhibitions and bookcrossing zones.

SUR offers you:

15.9.2 24H Reading Rooms

Sapienza has five 24-hour reading rooms equipped with WIFI and electrical outlets for the use of personal devices. Access is reserved to regularly enrolled Sapienza students holding the student card. Addresses, opening hours and requirements for access are available on the [dedicated webpage](#).

15.10 ICT services

You can use the campus Wi-Fi by selecting "Sapienza" from the available wireless networks. International students can access the network by using their enrolment identification number (matricola) as a username and their Infostud password.

The Student Information System Infostud, which is accessible from the student section of the Sapienza website, is the main tool to manage administrative procedures for students, including: registration, booking exams, viewing completed exams, printing forms and certificates such as the university fee paying slip, degree records with completed exams, enrolment certificates, etc. Infostud allows students to print certificates and documents with the University digital stamp of certification. Exchange students can use InfoStud for exam registration only. The results of the exams taken during the stay at Sapienza will be included in the official Transcript of Records issued by Sapienza International Office (non-EU students) or the Faculty (Erasmus+ EU students).

All enrolled students have a free Google account for Sapienza students. Your e-mail format will be: surname.name@studenti.uniroma1.it. The university will use this account for all communications. [Sapienza E-mail Account](#)

The ITC Infosapienza Centre manages our university's Moodle system. The Moodle platform also allows for the creation of communities of students and teachers aimed at sharing

information, stimulating debate and spreading good study habits. The system currently includes more than 1,000 courses involving almost 70,000 students and over 1,000 professors from all the Faculties.

16 The master's thesis

The fourth semester of Study Track 7 is dedicated to the master's thesis project, corresponding to 30 ECTS. For students in Study Track 7: Environmental Risk and Mitigation, the thesis may be registered at one of the three universities involved in the study track: Stockholm University (SU), the University of Lausanne (UNIL), or Sapienza University of Rome (SUR).

Students will be invited to indicate their preferred university for the thesis semester according to the procedure and deadlines communicated by the TRACEE programme. Students' preferences will be taken into account, but placement at a preferred university cannot be guaranteed. The final allocation of thesis university is made through the approved TRACEE procedure and may depend on factors such as available supervision, academic fit between the proposed thesis topic and the host university, capacity, budgetary or administrative constraints, mobility requirements, and fulfilment of academic progression requirements.

In addition to indicating a preferred thesis university, students must submit a proposal for a transdisciplinary thesis project. The thesis proposal must be approved according to the TRACEE thesis approval procedure before the student can proceed with the thesis project. The detailed procedure, deadlines, and responsible bodies will be communicated to students during the programme.

Registration, supervision, assessment, examination, and any local administrative requirements follow the regulations of the university where the thesis is registered. Students must therefore make sure that they follow both the common TRACEE thesis procedure and the local rules of the thesis university.

To be registered for the master's thesis project, students must have completed the common core course in semester 1, corresponding to 30 ECTS, and at least 30 ECTS from semesters 2 and/or 3 of the study track.

16.1 The master's thesis at Stockholm University

Students at Stockholm University should register to the course: "Transdisciplinary Studies of Climate, Environment and Energy, Independent Project".

The independent project is 30 ECTS and aims to provide experience and advanced knowledge in scientific and transdisciplinary work within the fields of climate, environment, and/or energy. Key elements include planning, execution, and reporting. Additionally, students will practice literature review, writing a scientific report, and presenting research results orally in seminars.

The course is divided into two parts:

- Part 1: Planning (5 ECTS). Assessment is based on a written report
- Part 2: Implementation (25 ECTS). Assessment is based on an oral and written presentation of the independent project

16.2 The master's thesis at the University of Lausanne

The master's thesis at UNIL is a personal research activity carried out under the responsibility of a teaching member of the Scientific Committee (professor, lecturer, assistant lecturer) as master's thesis supervisor. In the frame of TRACEE, the master's thesis is worth 30 ECTS, validated only if the grade, based upon the quality of the research, the thesis manuscript and the oral defence, is equal to or greater than 4.00. The jury is made up of at least the master's thesis director, the rapporteur if applicable, and an internal or external expert.

The oral defence usually takes place during the examination sessions. Defences which are not held during exam sessions will only be validated at the following exam session. To defend the dissertation, students must have successfully completed all courses of the Master.

Mind various deadlines in the process of selecting the project, writing and defending the thesis.

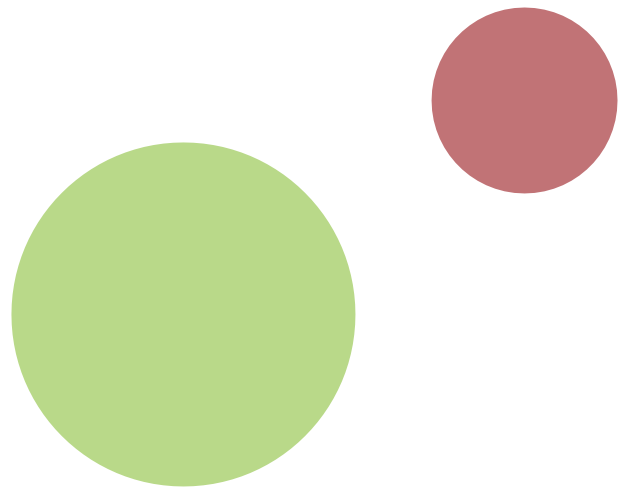

16.3 The master's thesis at Sapienza University of Rome

The master's thesis consists of an original study conducted with a rigorous scientific method under the supervision of one or more Faculty members. The 30-ECTS thesis work aims to impart advanced knowledge and expertise in scientific and transdisciplinary activity related to energy, the environment, and/or climate.

In order to be admitted to the final examination, the student must have earned all the ECTS required by the teaching regulations and must have fulfilled the administrative formalities required by the University Regulations. An oral defense of the thesis is given before a seven-member university jury. A 110-point grading scale is used for the final dissertation (66 is the minimum grade necessary to graduate). The graduation grade takes into account the average (credit-weighted) marks obtained in the examinations of the previous semesters, as well as of the thesis defence.
